From the Principal's Desk:

At Kadina Memorial School we value and respect the traditional custodians of the land upon which the school was built, the Narungga people. Whilst we always try to acknowledge the cultural connections, Reconciliation Week marks an important time in the Australian calendar where, as a school, we seek to ensure that we empower our students by learning through numerous events and activities. Being new to the school, I have been thoroughly impressed by the efforts made by all staff to increase the understanding and to ensure all participated in some way.

The theme of the week was "Don't keep history a mystery" and this was kept firmly in the front of minds of staff with well organised educational events held throughout the week. The theme invites all people to ask questions around what they don't know about our shared history.

Beginning the week with a whole school assembly was significant as it showcased our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students, who capably led the event. Importantly, many parents joined us for this day, showing how valued this occasion is within the community. Most of our parents and ATSI students were also treated to a spectacular morning tea, with the Year 10 hospitality students preparing a range of dishes that fused Aboriginal and European food together.

One of the highlights of the assembly was the unveiling of the newest piece of art created for the Reconciliation Week, where every student and staff member was invited to draw an Aboriginal design upon a small clay tile. These were linked together in the shape of a wave, with water being an important symbolism to the local Narungga indigenous people. Eventually this large piece of art, will be the central design for a new garden. We thank Art teacher Karen George and her team of parent volunteers who put in long hours to ensure it was complete before the assembly.



Sub School News

R-6 Corner

One of the highlights of the recent Reconciliation Assembly was the early years' students confidently singing 'Incy Wincy Wagu' in Narungga.

Narungga is the traditional language of the Narungga people, the traditional owners and custodians of Yorke Peninsula and is unique to this area. The close connection between language and country, offers students a unique insight into where they live, their environment and their place in the world. This ancient Aboriginal language will be lost if we do not continue to reawaken, teach, and practise it.

The Australian Curriculum requires students to learn a language. Through learning an indigenous language, students gain access to knowledge and understanding of Australia that can only come from an Aboriginal perspective. They learn about human relationships, connections to Country (the land and the environment), foods, plants, animals, sciences, dreaming stories and truths. It enables students to increase their understanding and respect for Indigenous Culture, thereby contributing to reconciliation.

Learning a language has significant educational benefits as it increases neural pathways in the brain, which enhances attention, develops greater "cognitive flexibility", higher analytic thinking skills, improves listening and literacy skills and leads to better academic performance in other areas. If we learn one language we are better able to learn other languages.

Narungga is introduced using an integrated approach including translating words from English into Narungga through themes (e.g. animals, spiders, sea creatures,

colours, body parts, weather) singing songs and rhymes and routinely using greetings and instructions.

Cultural understandings are developed by reading, telling, viewing and acting out dreaming stories, students expressing themselves through music, dance, ochre painting, creating art works and playing indigenous games.

Frequently this involves integrating with the HASS (History & Geography) topics and includes inquiring and questioning processes i.e. "Our Wonderings"

As students explore the language I have observed wonder, curiosity and enjoyment plus improved participation and engagement, as well as a sense of belonging and empowerment for our Aboriginal students.

We are fortunate that, in addition to myself, Nigel Raymond our Aboriginal Community Education Officer also speaks Narungga and is able to support this learning.

National Reconciliation Week



Primary students then shared their week's learning in sub school assemblies and told of new knowledge about traditional Aboriginal games, shelter, artwork, bush tucker, music, dance, dreamtime stories, dress and decorations.

This learning ensures that students and staff at Kadina Memorial School remain active participants in spreading the message of Reconciliation to the younger generations and contribute to building a reconciled Australia. Kadina Memorial School is committed to building positive, respectful relationships between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and other Australians and believes it is a part of everyone's life, every day of the year.

The School's Ruth Clarke Memorial Library has received three new resources acknowledging the academic achievements of 2017 Year 12s Catherine Sloper and Mackenzie Kay in the disciplines of English and History, respectively.

This is a Kadina Memorial High School tradition, which Kadina Memorial staff felt important to continue when the school amalgamated in 2013.

Former scholar Ruth Clarke, nee Pontifex, was a captain of Holder House and Head Prefect in her final year in 1941. She married Brian Clarke who was KMHS Principal from 1973-1971.

Kadina Memorial acknowledges the generosity of the Clarke family in making possible the Ruth Clarke Memorial Library and English and History subject prizes, which were first awarded in December 1990.

Mrs Clarke died in 1971 but her legacy continues today. Students are encouraged to refer to the Ruth Clarke Memorial Library for their many research assignments.

2018 ADF Long Tan Youth Leadership & Teamwork Awards

The Australian Defence Force (ADF) Long Tan Youth Leadership and Teamwork Awards started in 2006 to recognise students who demonstrated leadership and teamwork within both the school and the broader local community. At the same time, the awards recognise those who display strong values, such as doing one's best, respect for others and "mateship", characteristics that are integral to Australian society.

The awards are an important initiative by the Australian Government in conjunction with the ADF designed to encourage senior students – tomorrow's leaders – to actively participate in school and local community life. Two awards are offered each year (Year 10 and Year 12). Following a nomination process, the winning students are selected by a Kadina Memorial School leadership group based on the criteria set out by the ADF Long Tan Awards. This leadership group is headed by Year 10 and 12 Year Level Managers and advised by the Senior Wellbeing Leader, Care Group teachers and the Senior School Assistant Principal. Recipients of a Long Tan Youth Leadership & Teamwork Award will receive a certificate and a financial reward - \$250 for a Year 10 student and \$550 awarded to a Year 12 student.

Kadina Memorial has been a proud supporter of these awards since their inception, and are calling for nominations from Year 10 and Year 12 students.

Nomination forms are available from Mrs Wait (Year 10), Miss Tucker (Year 12) or the Front Office. The final date for nomination submissions is **Friday 6 July, 3pm, 2018**.

The recipients will receive their award at the annual Prize Giving Assembly in Term 4.

Community News

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD):

All schools are required to collect information about the numbers of students that they provide adjustments to under the Disability Discrimination Act (1992) and Disability Standards of Education (2005). From 2018, this data will be used as the basis for national funding.

The NCCD involves the collection of;

- the number of students receiving adjustments to enable them to participate in education on the same basis as other students
- the level of adjustment provided to students
- student's type of disability if known

Under the model the definition of disability is broad and includes learning difficulties, health and mental health conditions.

If your child is identified for inclusion in the Collection, the required information will be included in this year's data collection.
