

School communications

Good and effective communication is key to a successful partnership between school and home.

For example, Parent and Friends, canteen, student mentoring and in the classroom? Being involved with the school in anyway, is very rewarding. Assisting in the classroom helps with understanding your child's learning, assists students to improve their learning with one-on-one time and is also great fun, volunteering in the Canteen is lots of fun and helps to reduce the costs so that any profits can benefit the improvement of our canteen. Being involved in GC gives you an idea into the running of the school and all the 'extras' that teachers and leaders of the school are required to do outside of the classroom to keep the school running and achieving as well as it does.

Unit News

In Term 1 staff from Adelaide West Statewide Outreach Service visited the Disability Unit to discuss the implementation of Intensively Supported teaching programs. During the latter part of the term, teaching staff and some support staff visited the Adelaide West Special Education Centre to observe these programs being taught in their setting.

On Thursday and Friday of Week 2, Jennifer Young, Lesley Coy and Monique Starejko from Adelaide West Statewide Outreach Service held professional learning sessions for Junior and Senior class staff.

This was a valuable opportunity for our staff to receive training in “Curriculum Content and Teaching Strategies”. Sessions focused on AAC (Augmentative and Alternative Communication) and in particular Proloquo2Go, The Four Blocks of Literacy/Story tables (guided and self-selected reading, writing and working with words), and the Maths resource Numicon.

We were given lots of ideas for implementing strategies in our setting, and resources to support these strategies. Since the training, a number of activities have been introduced to enhance student learning, from chat groups discussing Proloquo2Go to story tables focusing on the ‘Spot’ series of books.

We are fortunate to have access to this professional learning and look forward to more sessions such as these in the future.

Dressing of the Graves

During Kernewek Lowender C1 took part in the Kadina Dressing of the Graves ceremony. The families supplied information about their ancestors to be celebrated for their input to Kadina and the Copper Coast, from this we made timelines and posters of their lives. This year the Dressing of the Graves committee included some children to be recognised. Through discussion and research, it was recognised that they weren't very old ranging from hours to months and they died from common illnesses. Thanks to helpful medicine, clean water and washing facilities we don't usually die from these anymore. Food and supplies were what they grew or could get locally. Travel was not as easy as today, they usually had to walk and it took a long time to get anywhere. One of the adults was a young boy Richard Tippet, he started to work in the mines at 12. Sadly, he died not long after starting in a mining accident. Karen helped us to create the flower arrangements for the ceremony. We each got to hand out the flowers for the families to place on the graves.

2019 ADF Long Tan Youth Awards

The ADF Long Tan Youth Leadership and Teamwork Awards started in 2006 to recognise students who demonstrate leadership and teamwork within both the school and the broader local community. At the same time, the awards recognise those who display strong values, such as doing one's best, respect for others and "mateship", characteristics that are integral to Australian society.

The awards are an initiative by the Australian Government in conjunction with the Australian Defence Force designed to encourage senior students – tomorrow's leaders – to actively participate in the life of their school and local community. Two awards are offered each year (Year 10 and Year 12). Following a nomination process, the winning students are selected by Kadina Memorial School leadership group based on the criteria set out by the ADF Long Tan Awards. This leadership group is headed by Year 11 and 12 Year Level Managers and advised by the Senior School Wellbeing Leader, Care Group teachers and the Senior School Assistant Principal. Recipients of a Long Tan Youth Leadership and Teamwork Award receive a certificate and a financial reward - \$250 for a Year 10 student and \$550 awarded to a Year 12 student.

Kadina Memorial School has been a proud supporter of these awards since its inception, and is calling for nominations from Year 10 and Year 12 students. Nomination forms are available from Miss Frost (Year 10), Miss Tucker (Year 12) or the Front Office. The final date for nomination submissions is Friday 5 July, 2019, 3pm. The recipients will receive their award at the Prize Giving Assembly in Term 4.

At the concert we heard James Morrison play the flugel, trombone and trumpet. We also heard Lizz Wright and Kurt Elling sing, Rickey Woodard play the tenor sax, and Joey DeFrancesco play the organ, which is a very unusual jazz instrument. Finally, we heard some other really cool, professional people play heaps of instruments including the drums, harmonica, tuba, baritone sax, trumpets and many more. We were all amazed at their skills.

The next day was competition day. We met Clare High School at our accommodation and did a quick rehearsal. After some technical difficulties we nervously started our first piece 'Contents Under Pressure.' As we went on with the song though, our nerves calmed and all went well. CSI: Crop Science Investigation

All year 10 students along with some Year 11 Agriculture students participated in the CSI: Crop Science Investigators mini field day at Central Yorke School on Thursday 9 May.

This was the introduction to a term-long program which explores challenges faced by the Australian grains industry.

Students rotated through six workshops to explore machinery innovation, and agricultural engineering, drones and precision agriculture, plant breeding and genetics, soil health and monitoring weather for improved input applications as well as immersive technology in farming.

Following the field day, students will now conduct an in-school research investigation to understand an issue or challenge faced by the agricultural industry and will work to develop a solution.

This solution may be an invention such as a new robot to destroy weeds in a paddock, an innovative way to store grain to prevent mould growth, or even a high-tech drone to monitor crops. The opportunities are endless and we look forward to seeing what the students come up with.

SAASTA Elite netballers

Kadina Memorial School students Chloe Jenkins, Mackenzie Weltman and Cody Howell participated in the Arafura Games in Darwin from Monday 29 April to Tuesday 7 May.

The trio were selected as part of the SAASTA Elite netball program for ATSI students, with only 20 chosen from SA. They played other Elite teams from each state and other countries such as Singapore, Fiji and even the Australian Defence Force.

Netball was just one of 20 sports offered at the Competition.

The lead-up to selection and competition involved travelling to Adelaide and training at Priceline Stadium and furthering their cultural learning.

Their inclusion was due to their attendance, work completion and attitude BOTH at school and at the Academy.

While in Darwin the girls visited the museum, the old prison, Lichfield National Park, ate barramundi, swam at a waterfall and saw a 6.7 metre saltwater croc!

The Fijian team sang at Arafura Closing Celebration with the girls saying the week-long event was an experience they'll never forget.



Youth Parliament representative

Year 12 student Hope Yates is an advocate for youth.

She has recently become involved in the YMCA's South Australian Youth Parliament, as Hope explains it's a non-partisan program aimed at empowering young people in the community and provided these details.

Youth Parliament provides a forum for young South Australians to express their views in a safe and supported environment. It's all about personal development, youth leadership and connecting politicians and decision makers with youth voices and opinions. Being a member of the 2019 Youth Parliament is a privilege, it gives me the opportunity to represent the voice of young people across the state.

I was assigned to the commerce, trade and employment committee, where we propose to write a bill on how small businesses can be optimized to their maximum potential in South Australia.

On the last weekend of the school holidays, I participated in a training where I met with other youth parliamentarians and we learnt about the parliamentary process, bill development, parliament debating, public speaking and teamwork skills. Australian Junior Surfing Competition

Year 7 student Meg Day will compete in the Surf Dive n'Ski Australia Junior Surfing Titles to be held in Western Australia's Margaret River in December.

This follows her outstanding qualifying results in the State competition consisting of three rounds at Yorkes, Parson's Beach and Middleton near Victor Harbor.

Meg surfed well and won rounds one and two and placed second in round three which crowned her the Under 14 Girls Champion and a place in the state team to compete in WA.

"I'm looking forward to Nationals and having the opportunity to surf some great waves in Margaret River in December. I love surfing and I'm very proud to represent my state doing something I love".



SA Secondary School Bowls Championship

A silver and bronze were won at the SA Secondary School Championship singles event on Friday 3 May. Kadina Memorial students Connor Brown, Thomas Depledge and Faith Scholes all competed in the singles. There were 22 individuals who competed in the singles competition and we were in sectional competitions, where each bowler played three games. The top 4 sectional winners out of seven sectionals moved onto finals. Connor and Faith won their sectionals and had two of the top four highest scores. Connor won his first final to play in the gold medal match, where he won the silver medal. Faith lost the first final to the eventual gold medal winner, earning her a place in the bronze competition which she won. Faith said it was great opportunity and they all enjoyed the day.



SA Dirt Kart Championship

Year 12 student Blake Tugwell competed in the three-day SA State Dirt Kart championship Titles at Roxby Downs in early May

He competed in the KT Light class with 18 other drivers, ranging in age from 14 years to 40 years.

Each racing round consisted of six laps. Day one saw him starting round one in 13th position and finishing 7th. Day two consisted of rounds two and three; Round 2 Blake started in 7th finishing 3rd, and in round 3 Blake started 17th coming across the line in 13th position.

At the end of day 2 Blake was equal third overall, but day three saw disaster strike in round four; Blake started the race from 4th position and whilst sitting in 3rd position he was taken out by another driver and did not finish the race, receiving zero points for that round and making it difficult to be in contention for the State Plate. He started the final 8 lap race in 11th position, and after a few position changes during the race, he crossed the finish line 10th. The overall results for the whole State Titles placed him in 10th. Blake was fortunate to attend the SA State Dirt Kart Title due to support from his sponsors.



Basketball Success

Well done to Year 7 student Airlie Ramsey who was in the winning Australian Country Junior Basketball Cup team playing in New Zealand recently.

Airlie was only one of four South Australian country athletes to be selected.

Congratulations to Sophie Franz, Year 7, who has been selected in the School Sport SA 12 Years and Under Girls Basketball team. Sophie will travel to Bendigo in August to play in the national competition.









