'Grounded in Truth - walk together with courage' was the theme of National Reconciliation Week (NRW) this year.

Kadina Memorial School students celebrated and acknowledged Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture and history during an assembly on Monday, with cultural lessons held throughout the week. Many students were fortunate to create several pieces of art and also try some traditional cooking.

Students and staff participated in a whole school project of designing a footprint with indigenous artwork which was displayed in classrooms across the school symbolising the theme of walking together as one.

Assembly guest speaker Jess Maynard spoke about "a spirit of goodwill, mutual respect and recognition of the effects of colonization on Aboriginal people" as the cornerstones of reconciliation.

On Friday Year 9 students participated in a role play designed to help students understand and empathise Australian history from an indigenous perspective.

Governing Council Report

Our meeting commenced with Head of Middle School Tarryn Germein, Middle School Student Wellbeing Leader Robyn Paterson and ICT Leader Renee Thamm sharing thoughts regarding the use of electronic devices in the Middle School. This and subsequent discussions with various groups will inform the progression of the Electronic and Communications Devices review.

KMSC student representatives Faith Scholes and Joel Martin presented a detailed powerpoint showing what is happening across the school, including the senior school lunch time netball championship with the winners playing a staff team to claim top of the podium.

The uniform committee has met and the contract will continue with the current supplier Sportspower for a further three years.

KMS Japanese Class ~ KMS の日本語クラス

We have had a great start to the year in Japanese classes with a Term 1 focus of revitalising the Japanese language and culture at Kadina Memorial. Year 3—6 students have been exposed to culture and language as well as practising the elements of reading, writing and speaking in Japanese. Culture lessons have included students being introduced to the Zodiac Calendar (Welcome to the Year of the Wild Boar/Pig!), identifying the similarities and differences of Sports Day in Australia and Japan, and analysing culture differences in the famous *My Neighbour Totoro* Japanese Anime movie.

The language focus for Term 1 was to assess the prior knowledge of students by allowing them to start at a beginner level of Japanese. Throughout the year students will work towards achieving the required language competency that is expected for their year level by the Australian Curriculum. This was implemented through students learning about everyday Japanese greetings and their context, followed by creating a poster on their chosen greeting showing their understanding. I was very pleased with the effort and dedication that the students put into making their posters and the pronunciation and understanding.

This term students in Year 3 are learning numbers, colours and the human body through the use of hands-on learning activities that help with retention and understanding. Years 4, 5 and 6 classes will look at grammar, new vocabulary and exposure to the three Japanese alphabets through the overarching focus of Japanese cuisine.

I have enjoyed getting to know the students and seeing the strong passion and curiosity for language learning that has developed across the term.

I look forward to another great semester full of Japanese language learning!

Unit News

Our 'Dinosaur' integrated term theme has given staff the opportunity to provide lots of engaging activities in all curriculum areas. The students have been able to answer questions relating to all aspects of dinosaurs. 'Do you know what is the smallest dinosaur? How tall is a diplodocus? What habitats did dinosaurs live in? What is a fossil?' These and other inquiry questions have been the focus of our learning this term.

The students made lots of dinosaur puzzles and learnt the names of dinosaurs that lived in the Jurassic era. The Junior class had fun adding their names to some of the dinosaurs. Welcome to the Jurassic Juniors: Talanasaurus Rex, Braydenodocus, Nateadactyl, Srihasadon, Oliviaotrops, Ayliaoraptor, Liamosaurus and Noahasaurus. They have enjoyed Investigative Play lessons using toy dinosaurs to play alongside their peers, providing opportunities for turn taking, requesting and collaborative learning.

In the Senior class, Maths lessons saw the students measuring dinosaurs using concrete materials, 'How many unifixcubes long is a T-Rex?' In Science, there were lessons about dinosaur eggs, dinosaur fossils and learning about the bone structure of dinosaurs, as well as naming the dinosaurs that are herbivores or carnivores. The students have enjoyed putting together their dioramas in Visual Arts, and singing and signing dinosaur songs in Music lessons.

I look forward to sharing more great learning about this theme at the end of the term.

Wattleseed and Macadamia Biscuits

Ingredients (makes about 34 cookies)

2 cups plain flour
1 tsp baking powder
½ tsp salt
10gm roasted wattleseed
1 cup macadamia nuts
1 cup packed brown sugar
170gm butter
1 egg
1 egg yolk
1 tbsp molasses
1 tsp vanilla essence
¼ cup granulated sugar (optional)
Preheat oven to 170°C

Spread the macadamias in a single layer on a baking tray and roast for 10 – 15 minutes. Check regularly and remove as soon as they start to brown. Leave to cool.

In a medium sized bowl sift together the flour, baking powder, salt, and wattleseed. In a large bowl cream the sugar and the butter until fluffy. Mix in the egg and egg yolk, the molasses and the vanilla essence.

Add the dry ingredients to the wet and stir through until just combined. Roughly chop the macadamias and add to the dough.

Wrap the cookie dough in plastic and pop in the fridge for at least two hours or overnight. *Though tempting, don't skip this step. Chilling the butter in the dough will prevent the cookies from spreading and flattening while baking.*

Scoop the chilled dough into tablespoon-sized balls. If using granulated sugar, roll the balls in the sugar to form a thick coating. Place on a tray lined with baking paper. Gently flatten with a fork and bake for 15 – 18 minutes. Remove from oven and leave to cool on baking tray for 2 or 3 minutes before transferring to a wire tray to cool completely. Best enjoyed fresh with a cold glass of milk, but will keep stored in an airtight container for up to a week.

'An Anthology of Un-Kept Secrets'

A powerful book titled 'An Anthology of Un-Kept secrets' has been launched detailing the deepest thoughts of young people from across the state, including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students from Kadina Memorial's Middle School.

Playwright Sally Harder and film-maker Albert Jamae met with local students 10-weeks ago to conduct a literacy workshop delving into the hearts and minds of young people.

Parts of the session were filmed producing a 15 minute documentary called 'Big Feelings, Big Dreams', while their thoughts were included in an artistic handmade book for the DreamBIG Festival.

The students attended the DreamBIG Festival in Adelaide on Thursday 23 May discovering their anonymous feelings were also felt by many students their own age.

Kadina Memorial School's Aboriginal Education Teacher Janine McKay said the film and book made for powerful viewing and reading, resonating deeply with students.

"We carefully leafed through the pages of the delicate art piece, unlocking the hidden anonymous thoughts and feelings of students from around the state," she said.

"Students discovered that other students had similar feelings of love, fear and hope. It was pretty exciting when students uncovered their own feeling written in the book.

"It was a fun and exciting day out that enabled us to experience many forms of art from around Australia," Mrs McKay said.



Each year every member of the Central Yorke SAASTA team is required to design a Guernsey as part of the program, with the chosen design worn at the three-day sports carnival from Thursday 20 to Saturday 22 June.

Guernsey Description

My guernsey design is based on the Sand Goanna which represents my people the Wangkangurru Yarluyandi from the Simpson Desert.

The little bit of running water represents the scarcity of water in the desert.

There are nine main wells in the Simpson Desert and I've represented all nine wells in my guernsey design.

The tracks through the middle are kangaroo tracks as the kangaroos have a big population in the desert and are a food source.

The Honey ants are there to represent a source of food for animals and the indigenous people living in the Simpson Desert.

Around the water, connected by two wells, are goanna tracks, as the goanna is one of the main animals living in the Simpson Desert.

Brain Cancer Awareness Day

In Term One, the Middle School Kadina Memorial School Council, made up of year 7-9 students discussed fundraising ideas for throughout 2019. During this meeting, many ideas were brain stormed around issues that have impacted friends, family and our wider community. As a committee, we chose The Kids' Cancer Project as one of the main fundraising events for 2019. To support this, the school held Pirate Day on Friday the 24th of May, which provided the opportunity for R-6 students to raise money for kids affected by cancer. It also allowed teachers and peers to open up discussion about cancer and the role it plays as the biggest killer of Australian children. Primary school students managed to raise a total of \$460.80 which will assist with research into kids' brain cancer.

Years 7- 12 students also got involved with the fundraising choosing to support The NeuroSurgical Research Foundation for their donation. The theme was 'Beanies for Brain Cancer' which was a fabulous success, as Middle, Senior students and staff wore their favourite beanies to school for a gold coin donation. This managed to raise a total of \$618.50 bringing the overall total raised to beyond \$1,000.

As part of their learning, students were shown a video called Ally's Story. This was about a woman who was diagnosed with a brain tumour shortly after the birth of her first child.
