## Celebrating Semester One

### Principal's Desk: Alistair Williams

The mid-year break is a perfect time for students to rest, rejuvenate and reflect. SACE students are at the half-way mark and pacing themselves with goal setting and good time management critical to their success.

I recently wrote about goal setting and how successful students usually have clearly defined goals. My experience also indicates that those students who have their goals aligned to a career pathway are often more effective. They know exactly what they want and what they need to do to get there; this is why we spend time informing students about different careers.

### Career Expo

July 25 will see the inaugural Career Expo held at the CCSLC. The aim of this event is to educate our students more intensely about specific occupations and to introduce them to careers that perhaps they had not thought about before.

Vocational Education and Training Coordinator Erin Schneider has organised presenters from a variety of fields including the universities, Nyrstar, SAPOL, Country Health, WISE Employment and Rosewarne. Students will talk with people who work in a wide range of occupations asking them what their job is really like and understanding what skills they might need to be employed. We hope that most will come away with a more informed view of the world of work and a clearer idea about the future.

### Year 12 Exam Week

A review of exam week has seen a new approach this year, with non-exam lessons running as normal. What does this mean for your Year 12? For many it will mean that exam week will be another normal week of school, where full attendance is required. Others, however, will have their examinable lessons cancelled allowing for them to undertake a little more revision. These students will also have negotiated their time at school for the week with their teachers to ensure that they can maximise their revision without missing any learning.

### Year 12 Day

Year 12 Coordinator Megan Tucker has again coordinated a comprehensive timeline for the Annual Year 12 Day. Our students will be prepared for life post-school including how to apply for university and TAFE, learning about the benefits that are available for them through Centrelink and also what their rights are as an employee. Importantly, there is also a focus on their physical and mental health with Encounter Youth working with the group.

## New screening laws for volunteers

Stronger, more effective and transparent screening laws for people working or volunteering with children have been introduced in South Australia. The new screening laws were recommended as part of federal and South Australian royal commissions, to help keep children safe in our communities. The new laws mean that from 1 July 2019 everyone working or volunteering with children must have a valid child-related check.

Also changing from 1 July 2019 is the state's current system for child-related employment screenings, which will be replaced with a 'working with children check' (WWCC). This new check is coming in to better protect your children and make sure that people working or volunteering with children are suitable. It does this through a monitored and more robust assessment of a person's eligibility to work or volunteer with children. Because the check is monitored, immediate action can be taken if a person is charged with a concerning offence. The new check covers a person's national criminal history including all spent convictions, pending and non-conviction charges, and other disciplinary and child protection information.

A WWCC is valid for five years and is portable across roles and organisations throughout South Australia.

Current, valid child-related employment screening checks by DHS/DCSI will be recognised as a WWCC until they expire. There is also a 12 month transition period for anyone with a National Police Certificate assessed by their organisation, with the certificate valid till 1 July 2020.

For most people, this means they don't yet need to do anything to be ready for the new law which started on 1 July 2019.

## R-6 Corner

### Importance of Physical Education lessons

Physical Education at Kadina Memorial School is part of whole school learning, encouraging and challenging students to develop life-long skills for active, positive and productive participation in today's world.

R-6 PE focuses on developing fundamental movement skills, movement sequences, game sense and self-regulation through a range of drills, games, sporting events and problem-solving activities across the 4 terms.

Learning activities are designed to provide students the opportunity to develop and display respect for rules and umpiring, ethical behaviour and socially acceptable emotional responses to accidents, disputes and outcomes in activities and events. Students are encouraged to use rock-paper-scissors for minor issues and agreed processes for larger disputes.

Physical development aligns with cognitive development, especially when children are in charge of their own learning, such as playing on playground equipment. They progress through a number of movement challenges such as swinging across the monkey bars, climbing to the fork of the tree, jumping and landing safely. Leaping up to the bar, swinging and landing correctly.

Below, Reception students learn PE is an outdoor and indoor activity, as experienced during the recent wet weather. Working in threes, students tested their throwing accuracy and recorded their results. This activity incorporated all areas of childhood development – working collaboratively, literacy, numeracy, and physical coordination.



Team games such as this encourage student cooperation, respect for rules and team spirit as they work together to fairly collect and count the number of tennis balls retrieved by their group.

The Junior students made toast and practised spreading using a variety of toppings, used a sandwich toaster to make cheese toasties, and loved making their mini hotdogs and pizzas. They also enjoyed icing biscuits last week and decorating them with sweet treats.

The Senior students learnt how to make Anzac biscuits, Cornish pasties, muffin pizzas, cupcakes and pikelets, and looked forward to Friday afternoons when they could taste what they had made. It's great to see the smiles on their faces when they have been able to make something on their own, and it tastes good as well.

## School Card 2019 – it is not too late to apply

The School Card scheme offers financial assistance with educational expenses for students attending government schools in South Australia. A family's financial circumstances may change from year to year and so families must fill in an application form for School Card assessment each year.

- If you have not already filled in an application form this year, it is not too late to apply, please come into school and complete an application form.

### Please Note: changes to School Card income limits:

Eligibility for School Card assistance is dependent upon the combined family gross income for the 2017-2018 financial year being within the following School Card income limits:

If your family's gross income did not meet the School Card income limits for the 2017-2018 financial year, there still may be the possibility of School Card assistance. ## 2019 Premier's ANZAC Spirit School Prize

Year 10 student Brodie Holland recently participated in 2019 Premier's ANZAC Spirit School Prize.

His entry involved a detailed research paper on Private Ralph Broadbent which was appropriately referenced from various sources.

We are pleased to share with you the second part of Brodie's research titled ANZAC Spirit.

### ANZAC SPIRIT

There are two quotes that I believe sum up the ANZAC spirit. The first quote is by Charles Bean, a journalist and historian who was an Australian War Correspondent during the First World War. He said this:

*"ANZAC stood, and still stands, for reckless valour in a good cause, for enterprise, resourcefulness, fidelity, comradeship and endurance that will never own a defeat."*

More recently, Arthur Bourke OAM, has said the ANZAC spirit is:

*"A powerful driving sensation that can only be felt. It is a feeling that burns in the heart of every Australian and New Zealand countryman. A warm, tender, fiery even melancholy ideal that nurtures intense patriotism in the innermost soul of everybody."*

Ralph Broadbent was described as someone who was always cheery. His platoon commander described him as being cool and collected under heavy fire and said that he was a splendid companion to have nearby when things were 'hot'. This shows that Ralph demonstrated the spirit of mateship because he kept everyone in good spirits, he assured his mates that everything was going to be alright. He comforted them in times of stress and he always made them laugh. Ralph was also described as a true Australian and to me a true Australian supports their mates and keeps them going in the toughest of times and Ralph did just that. He wasn't a bully he was a friend to all, he cared about everyone in the 43 battalion and was helping them until his death.

Ralph showed a tremendous amount of perseverance as he was halted by an unknown illness before or around the time he arrived in England. And then just as he was about to step onto the front line he was sent back to hospital. Even when he got there he was under the most unfavourable conditions and still managed to stay cheerful. This would have been unbelievably hard due to conditions such as the weather. In winter it was either raining or snowing and, due to the heavy artillery fire, this caused the natural drainage system to be damaged making the ground a muddy mess. The noise would also have been

challenging. Ralph would have heard screaming, the sounds of bombs landing near him, and the groaning of injured men. Ralph would have also had to endure severe lack of sleep and finally what he would have witnessed before his death would have been horrific.

All these variables would have caused a person to feel extremely unpleasant and unsafe and so to keep happy and to look on the bright side of life would have been extremely challenging. Although Ralph was taken from us early, he left behind an everlasting memory of cheerfulness and extreme persistence.






