

## Year 12 Day

Concurrently with this pathway event, the Year 12 day was held. Not only does this day prepare students for what is left of the year, talking through how to maintain their focus, health and wellbeing, and prepare for 2020.

I was fortunate to listen to John Carbone, from Regional Development Australia, and local employers present to our students the realities of getting a job. They talked through the strategies that would help a school leaver to be more successful in gaining employment, with one of the most important being to start thinking about it now, not in January next year.

Significantly social media was also a focus, with John pointing out that so many employers now "google" their potential employees to see what they can find out before offering them a role. There were several stories shared where it was found that Facebook had been the downfall of candidates.



The theme of looking to the future will continue this term with subject selection for our secondary students. It is important that you, as a parent/carer, give advice and support your child through these times, however, you should always feel comfortable in contacting the school.

## Mobile Phones

Mobile phones in educational environments continue to be a controversial topic, with New South Wales and Victoria banning them in schools. Within South Australia, many schools have also enforced their right to restrict the use of mobile phones.

Currently our mobile phone policy is under review with a committee of parents and teachers having collaborated in the writing of the new guidelines. They have taken on board best advice from several key areas, including teachers, researchers and our own Wellbeing Team to

produce the document that is being shared within this newsletter.

Whilst what is contained within this document may seem like a big change to a few parents/carers, it is in fact, very similar to what already exists within the school, with most students not being able to use their phones during class time. Whilst some students are currently able to access their phones during break time, most do not, instead choosing to talk with their friends, read books in the library or involve themselves in an activity.

Over the next few weeks, parents/carers will be able to feed in their thoughts, both positive and negative, about the guidelines through the link below. After August 24, this final set of data will be used to fine-tune the guidelines before releasing them in Term 4.

## R-6 Corner: Building maths understanding through games

Welcome to Term 3. A key way we are building students' understanding of number sense is through playing maths games.

In addition to being fun and motivating, games provide students with opportunities to explore number concepts and strategies. Playing games encourages maths thinking as students find different strategies for solving problems and deepen their understanding of numbers. When played repeatedly, games support students' maths fluency.

Parents can learn about their children's number understandings and maths thinking by playing games with them at home.

To support the home to school connection this term we are doing something different.

Regularly we will, via facebook, share a maths game for families to play at home. These games involve minimal extra resources (eg dice, pack of cards).

Teachers will check in with students about playing games at home.

We encourage families to play the games but share this caution: **BEWARE**, many students are highly skilled with games and out to beat any adults who dare to play them! Thank you for taking the time to help your child's maths understandings grow in this active, fun-filled way.

## Unit News

This term our integrated theme is Community Helpers. In Weeks 1 and 2 we will focus on the Police, Weeks 3 and 4 the Fire Service, Weeks 5 and 6 the Ambulance and Doctors, Weeks 7 and 8 Australia Post, and in Weeks 9 and 10 Waste Management. We will be having visits from some of these community helpers during the term and look forward to sharing information and photos from these visits in the next newsletter.

Maths lessons will focus on Money Maths, where students will learn to recognise and order Australian coins according to their value, count small collections of notes and coins, as well as representing money values in multiple ways. Both the Senior and Junior classes have been busy role-playing shopping, and having lots of fun taking turns being either the shopkeeper or the customer. The Senior Class will continue their weekly shopping program at Woolworths, where the students have the opportunity to purchase items and pay for them at the checkout.

Literacy lessons will continue with the Jolly Phonics program, along with a focus on the 4 Blocks of Literacy components (working with words, shared reading, writing and self-selected reading). Students are enjoying being engaged in learning sounds, and reading some words and sentences independently. These lessons build on the great work that has already been achieved in the first half of this year.
