From the Principal's Desk

Focus on Learning

Schools are organisations established for learning. Learning happens in many different ways and can look very different depending on the purpose and context. Building in the sandpit to explore capacity and structures, debating environmental issues, problem-solving using technology and mathematical understandings, playing in the yard and the traditional academics are all important learning opportunities where social, cognitive and physical understandings are developed.

At Kadina Memorial we are making a conscious effort to refer to every opportunity at school as learning not work. It's a slight change but a powerful one. When families and educators use learning language students approach and value tasks differently.

We are, when possible, rewording all processes and communications to learning language. For example last year the homework policy when reviewed was rebadged as the 'home learning policy'. When blue behaviour forms are completed we are consciously using learning language eg 'didn't attempt learning' rather than 'refusing to do work'.

Please help us to help your child by ensuring we all talk about learning, acknowledge and value all learning opportunities and celebrate learning improvement.

Together we can make a difference to your child's attitude and dispositions by focussing all our time and energy on learning conversations.

Celebrating Career at Farewell

Mr Gerry Guerin, a respected educator, a colleague and friend to staff, students, parents and community was officially farewelled last Wednesday at the school. It was pleasing to see so many former members of staff, community and exstudents take the time to attend this function in honour of Gerry's contribution to education at Kadina Memorial High School and Kadina Memorial.

Gerry had a career spanning 41 years, 33 at Kadina mostly teaching in the areas of mathematics and science. It was Gerry's general interest in his students and their wellbeing which led to his appointment as School Counsellor, Year 12 Coordinator and Transition Education Coordinator.

Gerry was extremely active in school governance being a member of the High School Council, and staff representative on the amalgamation committee.

Reconciliation Week Activities

Reconciliation is about the proper recognition of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and their contribution to Australian society both in the past and in the present. It involves building mutually respectful relationships between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and communities, and all other Australians.

Achieving reconciliation will require raising the awareness and knowledge of Aboriginal history and culture, and changing attitudes that are often based upon myths and misunderstandings. Reconciliation is about encouraging actions to bring about this change to build better relationships between all Australians and to improve outcomes for Aboriginal people.

Our Aboriginal Education Teacher, Mrs Janine McKay and our Aboriginal Community Education Officer, Mr Nigel Raymond have been working with students and staff on a range of reconciliation activities, this includes an assembly to be held this Friday at 11am at the school. All members of our community are invited to this assembly.

What to do when things go wrong

- 1. We all want to spring to our children's defence when they are upset or life seems unfair. Before taking any action it's a good idea to sit down with them and let them tell you, without interruption, what has happened. Find out what has upset them. Ask them what they think would put things right. Children, like us, need the chance to unload to a sympathetic ear. Often children are prepared to fight their own battles and just want to vent. There's nothing worse than charging into the fray and discovering your child has got over it and moved on.
- 2. Help them think through what has happened. Often, clearly thinking about events gets things into perspective or helps them see how they contributed to what happened. A good lesson for children is to learn which battles to choose. Life holds many irritations and we learn to take most of them in our stride. Erupting over minor incidents is no way to build sound relationships with classmates or teachers or our own credibility.
- 3. After you have slept on it, are still worried, or your child asks you to, contact the class teacher. The teacher may be worried too and will be able to suggest the next step. Or you will be able to get a clearer picture of class dynamics or reassurance the incident was a minor one with no consequences for your child.
- 4. If you are still concerned, the relevant Heads of School and Principal's doors are always open to parents. Schools really appreciate parents who want to find solutions rather than lay blame, especially when you show staff you understand that they have to take into account the interests of all the children in their care and cannot be pushed into punishing other children.
- 5. Build on your relationship with your children's teachers. Being familiar with the school and the other children helps you put together a more complete picture of what goes on at school. When you and your child's teachers keep communications open, trusting and positive your child is the one who will reap the benefits.

Sub School News

R-6 Corner: Inference: A key to powerful learning

Children starting school are inquisitive, active learners, constantly thinking about the world around them and interacting with it in meaningful ways.

These powerful learners take this inquisitive approach to their education and ask questions while they are reading, writing and thinking mathematically.

Our challenge as educators is to ensure all learners continue to build a broad powerful learning skill set so they are learning for the future.

Our reading focus emphasises this by ensuring students understand their reading through the use of a range of strategies.

A critical transition point has been identified as students move from Year two where books are strategically introduced through guided reading to year three when the lexile framework is used for independent reading. Staff explicitly focus on specific reading strategies including inference to ensure this continuity of learning for students.

An **inference** is an idea or conclusion drawn from evidence and reasoning of what the author is saying (although this may not be directly written). Although we learn about some things by experiencing them first-hand we gain other knowledge by **inference**.

Inference is a complex skill and is included within many reading strategies.

Helping children understand when information is implied, or not directly stated, improves their skill in drawing conclusions and making inferences. These skills are integral for reading, science, history, geography and health.


Opportunities for families to assist their children to develop and practise inferential thinking include:

- Explaining we make conclusions about things and draw inferences all the time. Families discussing information (or clues) and developing a conclusion together is powerful modeling and practice. For example, Dad seems tired tonight. How can we tell? He's rubbing his eyes, he's on the couch, he was yawning at the dinner table.
- Picture books with no words provide children with practise using clues to create meaning. There are no wrong stories with wordless picture books (eg Rosie's Walk), only variations based on what the "reader" sees and puts together. The school and public library have many of these books.
- Play twenty questions. This familiar game helps build inference skills. As children develop skill with the game, avoid asking closed questions like,

"Is it a dog?" Rather, ask more open questions like, "Does it walk on four feet?" When your child solves the puzzle, talk about helpful questions together.

- Build strong understandings of words: their varied meanings and contexts eg the word shepherd can refer to maneuvering or someone who looks after sheep.
- Create scenarios in which your child uses what they already know to predict an outcome. For example, what time will we arrive at our destination? Calculating the likely arrival time requires using known and new information including reading odometers, clocks and family habits.
- Capitalising on varied texts. A broad reading diet including non-fiction, tables, graphs and newspaper articles builds understandings of the world and combines information for understanding.

Unit News

This term we are fortunate to have two Pre-Service Teachers working alongside their classroom mentors. Ktora Dannenberg is in the Junior Unit class with Andrea Harvie and Troy Taylor is in the Special Options Secondary Small class with Sandra Hawes.

These two teachers are gaining valuable skills, knowledge and insights into daily life in a classroom and have been responsible for planning, teaching and assessing Units of work for the term.

Ktora has planned a Humanities and Social Sciences Unit about 'Homes'. This theme encompasses the topics: Animal Homes, Homes from the Past, Our Homes, What homes are made of and Rooms in the Home. Under the guidance of Ktora, the students have made sensory boxes, matched animals to their habitats, and made letterboxes with their address on it.

This theme has also integrated other curriculum areas with a focus on learning about the characters and settings in the story book 'Inside Mary Elizabeth's House', the introduction of new vocabulary on a word wall and handwriting lessons. Lots of pretend play fun has also been had in Drama lessons where the students have transformed the classroom into a cubby house.



Troy has been involved in planning Literacy lessons around graphic novels, key word noting and summarising as well as sharing Word Study lessons with Sandra. He has also focussed on the Reconciliation theme in lessons. A highlight of lessons will be making a collection of comic strips to be given to the Junior Unit class.

Troy will also be responsible for Science lessons where the topic is 'Living Things'. The students will learn about what makes a living thing and will be involved in completing a project about a specific organism as well as making an Ant Farm. Another Unit of work in Maths will

incorporate learning about Pet Ownership and preparing a budget about the cost per ownership.

As can be seen Ktora and Troy have been very busy planning some fantastic lessons for the students as well as the positive relationships they are forging with students, staff and families.

Apple Recall 'duck bill' power adaptor

In February Apple announced a voluntary recall of its duck bill power adaptor for all charging devices. These adaptors have been identified as a potential fire hazard, and to Apple's knowledge there have been a number reported cases around the world. Apple released this design in 2003, and was still in use until Mid-2015. This style of adaptor can be found on all genuine MacBook, iPhone, iPad and iPod charging devices. The picture shows you the style that is affected. Simply put, if it is round, it needs to be replaced. This doesn't affect the actual charger, or the long lead adaptor. It is only the short 'duck bill'.

MAKAHbiz Sausage Sizzle

More than 550 sausages and 400 drinks were sold at Friday's MAKAHbiz sausage sizzle, making a profit of \$1,250.

The sausage sizzle was the work of 16 KMS Year 11 and 12 students studying Certificate III Business Administration, under the Gonski funding. They are known as MAKAHbiz and study at MADEC.

For three months the students have planned the event, learning how to write to sponsors, prepare posters, letters, spreadsheets and participate in meetings. They learnt how to communicate with various people within the school and parties within the wider community.

As a team, they coordinated who they would contact for sponsorship, planned their schedules and worked out what items they could bring to use on the day.

With hard work and planning, they received generous sponsorship and were able to cater for over 200 lunch orders for the R-4 classes and served students from the middle and senior classes.

It was a very successful event resulting in a profit.

The money will go towards their MAKAHbiz t-shirts and community-based activities throughout the year, including the Kadina Show and supporting Shoe Boxes of Love for South Australian victims of bushfires or other community disasters.

All activities the students have been involved in provide them with real life experiences related to their course. The sausage sizzle has contributed towards a third of their training. Completion of the course will cover a Year 12 SACE subject and go towards their ATAR, if they choose to go on to university.

Environmental Discovery Day

During Week 11 in Term 1, 150 KMS students gathered for an engaging, hands-on environmental discovery day organised by Natural Resources Northern and Yorke.

Kadina Memorial School Primary Years Coordinator Kylie Williams said the School Environment Day for Years 3 and 4 students was a great sensory experience, allowing children to connect to the natural environment in which they live.

'From native seeds to the insect and reptile world and how we can better deal with waste, students were engaged, entertained and challenged in many ways,' she said.

The students participated in a series of six, 25 minute presentations on birds, insects, butterflies, spiders, lizards and shells, delivered by pesenters from DEWNR, SA Museum Discovery Centre, Greening Australia, SA Malacological Society, Wipe out Waste and T and M Ecologists.

Ms Williams said 'some children had an opportunity to hold a sleepy lizard, while discussions about the evolution of spiders and what good they could possibly do in our world, alive or dead, were popular sessions.

In many instances, the fear of spiders seemed to disappear and a fascination of the tarantula specimen was evident. Students enjoyed listening to guest speakers and connecting with their environment firsthand rather than touch an electronic screen to source instant information.'

Natural Resources Northern and Yorke Community Ranger David Sloper said that the primary school environmental education days were an opportunity for younger students to gain an understanding of the natural environment.

'The speakers tailor their presentations to the age group and concentrate on simple messages.

This year's event at Kadina Memorial School featured hands-on presentations on Local Reptiles, Native Seed Dispersal, Molluscs, Spiders, Butterflies and Waste Recycling.

They use live and dead specimens, as well as props, to help the students make the connections, for example, to attract and retain butterflies in their home or school gardens, they not only need food plants for the butterflies, but also for the caterpillars.'

Follow up activities in the classroom included collecting library resources, writing Information Reports and information sharing.

The Year 3 and Year 4 classes would like to thank Ms Kylie Williams and the Natural Resources Northern and Yorke for presenting the event.

At the moment the Ag facilities are full of animals and plants. All the Royal Adelaide Show sheep, goats and steers have settled in and students are learning how to handle the animals.


As part of the Year 10 Mini Businesses, piglets have arrived which have been a hit with all the students enjoying handling them and observing their behaviours.

This includes a dairy advocate coming in and speaking with the students this week.

The Year 9 cohort has just finished planting their winter vegetables and will monitor the growth rate. In addition students have begun learning about different goat behaviours. The Year 11/12 class has organised their cropping trial, external investigations and are now starting to work with the steers in preparation for the Show and completing a soil evaluation of the Agriculture grounds.
