Next Friday 9 December we will celebrate the 2016 School Year with our two major Prize Presentation Assemblies at the Copper Coast Sport and Leisure Centre.



KINDness Campaign

'To the people who have become my sister's friends, I thank you for making her happy and showing her what a good friendship is.'

And then there are the things we forget to say or maybe should say more often: 'I think you are so beautiful and amazing and you really inspire me. I want you to know that I will always be here if you need to talk.'

'I KINDly pledge to only say good things to others and use my voice to stand up for someone who can't stand up for themselves.'

Wise words from our Year 8, 9 and 10 girls who attended a workshop run by local Yorke Peninsula singer, songwriter and all round nice person, Holly Ball. Holly had been in the United States when she discovered the power of the KINDness Campaign, designed by two energetic young women who were looking to address why girls emotionally hurt other girls.

The first hour was spent watching a road trip around America where females were interviewed about the moments that mattered during their schooling. Girls spoke of their experiences where they were negatively affected by negative messages and behaviours.

Everyone agrees bullying has always existed, nothing new there. So why is there so much talk of it? The reality is that it has intensified massively due to technology and media. Girls today potentially see over 30,000 images a day of perfection via internet ads, phones, magazines, Kim Kardashian's Instagram, billboards, reality shows such as 'Real Housewives', and any other screen you can think of!! All of these messages de-sensitize our girls, no longer defined by what we think 'normal' is. It becomes harder to like ourselves when we compare ourselves with the constant Photoshop perfection. Females are seen to be competitive for love, fashion, calories, success and appearance.

Bullying often occurs when: 'I hurt, you hurt'. A type of acting out of our own discomforts. Girls resort to revengeful behaviours and they control and create the girl world in a 2D environment with a screen to separate them. Having a screen between you and your 'enemy' increases the likelihood of ongoing issues, this format has intensity with its scope and speed and it is there 24/7.

Suffice to say there were many tears as we were all able to identify with stories of devastation and how the hurt can impact on people throughout their lives. Our brains do not forget emotional moments related to traumatic incidents. Harsh words actually affect sections of our brain connected to feelings (amygdala and limbic system) and our memory (hippocampus).

So how can we change the damage females do to each other? It begins with awareness of what we think we need to say about the female next to us, how we may say it and catching it before we say it. It also taps into that old world saying: 'If you can't say something nice about someone, don't say it at all'. Remember sometimes there is a reason that the saying 'silence is golden' is just that.

Simply being kind costs nothing. In a life which is so precious, kindness leaves no scars. The solution is within us. Everyone has the basic need for unconditional positive regard. Treating each other well, being happy around each other, standing up and standing by a friend are all protective factors in creating a positive girl world.

Our Year 8, 9 and 10 students began with a pledge to themselves which was publically declared on our Kind Wall. Kind apologies from past incidents were made to family or friends. Kind Cards were written to thank someone who was a good friend or proactive bystander.

The girls wrote impressive statements. Staying true to our word and our values, acting on our positive thoughts, using a positive mindset is where we hope our girls can go as they navigate through tricky times. Through genuine kindness we can keep lifelong friends who stay with you to the end.

To finish up in life with the statement 'I was kind', says a great deal about the person and their actions, perhaps more so than 'I was smart, attractive, rich or talented'.

School Based Apprenticeships

School Based Apprenticeships (SBA) and Traineeships continue to be a worthy way to gain valuable work, trade skills and employment, with 24 KMS students signing contracts this year.

This figure is likely to rise with more students scheduled to meet with businesses in the next few weeks.

Agriculture has provided the majority of SBA, with students gaining a valuable insight into seasonal work, such as harvest.

Other industries have been automotive, hairdressing, engineering, carpentry, horticulture, butchery, retail, kitchen operations and business administration.

We also have 12 students completing their School Based Apprenticeships from 2015.

Students involved in SBA successfully manage working for an employer and studying for their qualifications while earning SACE credits.


