From the Principal's Desk

As we move into the final weeks of the term, classes are well established with diverse and rich learning opportunities. From senior years poetry reading around a mock campfire, to chickens on site for imprinting and data gathering for analysis in the middle school, to making models to explore the brain's purpose functions and work in our kitchen garden in the primary years students are relishing the purposeful and engaging learning opportunities. It has been a busy time off site too, with senior outdoor education camps on the River Murray, the Small Class participating in their first ever swimming carnival, and the Year 5 to 7 Lightning Netball and Football Competitions. All of these experiences are hands-on, team building, collaborative, creative, and build scaffolding around 'traditional' learning in class.

Next week is R-12 Interview Week. Family interviews are a great way to find out about your child's progress at school. By going to an interview, families show their interest in their child's learning and school life.

These short 10 minute meetings are between you and your child's teacher(s). Being invited to a parent-teacher interview doesn't mean there's a problem with your child's progress.

Interviews provide an opportunity to:

 learn more about your child's academic, emotional and social development

- meet and get to know your child's teachers
- help your child's teachers understand more about your child
- make plans with the teacher about how you can both support your child
- strengthen your relationship with your child's school
- let us know what is working well for your child/raise concerns.

For Years 7-12 students, in addition to the traffic light check provided with the last newsletter, the interviews are the second part of the assessment and reporting process for the term and replace the previous end of term report. A reminder to parents of students who have an NEP, this is an ideal opportunity to come in, review and sign.

We encourage all families to take the opportunity to meet with their child's teacher as these rich discussions establish the platform for a successful Term 2 of learning. We use the online booking system provided with the last newsletter, also see this newsletter for code details. Principal's Report Continued:

Progress is continuing on our STEM Works project, with a recent Design Start Up meeting held. Discussion focused on fine-tuning our project design and establishing project administration procedures, such as safety protocols.

Also, importantly, it allowed school leadership to be introduced to key personnel working on the project. This included departmental representatives, along with the project's architect and key engineers. We are fortunate in that our project is being led by former KMHS student, Daniel Toole, who has been seconded by DPTI for the STEM works. His strong local knowledge will assist in the project management.

Our STEM Works project has a budget of \$3.5 million that will be used for three facilities to maximise integrated Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths approaches. The current four-room science block will be upgraded to allow for flexible learning opportunities with glass walls and student breakout rooms featuring in the design. A new media suite will take the place of C4, C5, C7 and C8 and include state of the art recording and digital technology spaces. The existing four reception classes will move into a new Early Years Centre with shared learning multi use spaces and wonderful outdoor learning areas. The current reception buildings will be removed with new outdoor learning areas created in their place.

Key staff are actively involved in the planning stages and we are fortunate the architect is very creative and responsive to our feedback.

It is anticipated the concept phase will take six weeks to complete. This process includes engaging engineers and developing a more detailed report to set out an indicative building program and to inform the procurement strategy.

Prior to construction beginning, the project may be required to undergo planning/development approvals if required and also building certification.

It is anticipated the majority of builders for the 139 STEM Works schools will be engaged from mid-year with the expected finish date for our project Term 4, 2018.

School Traffic Safety

Ensuring safe and healthy ways to go to and return from school is a priority for a task group from the Kadina Pre-School, Kadina Memorial School, Harvest College, the District Council of the Copper Coast and the Department of Planning Transport and Infrastructure's Way2Go Program.

In response to an initial concern raised by the Pre School, representatives met last year to identify key issues and scope collecting extensive data from families, students and staff this year. The information was combined with demographic information and car travel records to identify key trends and possible opportunities. The focus has not been on a quick fix **but** rather to

<u>determine the underlying issues to explore to build</u> long term, effective changes.

At the most recent meeting, the following key themes were identified:

- At all sites, significant pedestrian and car congestion exists for a relatively short space of time. Often this results in pedestrians moving haphazardly which increases safety issues
- Some parents model unsafe behaviour both as drivers and pedestrians
- A strong focus on car travel exists even though many students could either walk and or ride to school or walk from the school/kindy to their family in a car parked a short distance away (and reduce congestion)
- The speed of vehicles
- Any changes would be best connected to the broader Kadina concept plan
- The opportunity to explore and involve the community with potential changes and to use social media to influence thinking exists.

The department, together with our local Council, will now use these themes to work together with the sites to deliver tangible solutions. We will meet late in Term 2 to discuss the various options and opportunities available. At KMS Robyn Paterson, our Middle School counsellor will collaborate with the KMSC safety representatives to explore options for our school from their perspective.

Narelle Koch (representing parents), teacher Sue Stanley, Business Manager Carol Saunders and I will progress with staff, Governing Council (including the Grounds Committee) and Parent Club ways we can build sustainable habits for safer and healthy methods to access school.



Above, a typical busy morning on Doswell Terrace from 8.30am. During this time I observed a Middle School student running across the traffic, a car braking suddenly for an Early Years student to cross safely, numerous students exiting the vehicle onto the road and not footpath side, and many healthy, able bodied senior students chauffeured to the school gates!

Senior School: Year 10 Work Experience

Work Experience is highly valued at Kadina Memorial School. The benefits are numerous for our students. It allows them to get a first-hand look at the work force, it enables students to make informed decisions about their future, and it also improves skills such as communication, team work and time management.

In 2016 several departmental changes occurred to the Work Experience program in government schools. One of the changes requires all workplace locations to be visited and appropriately documented by a school staff member prior to students attending the work experience.


Year 10 has been the traditional year of work experience. In the past, students studying the PLP have been required to attend a one week block. This year, there are approximately 120 students completing the PLP. The new guidelines create logistical difficulties. In order to continue our work experience program we have made several changes for 2017, outlined below.

Work Experience for Year 10 students will be **optional** and is offered on two separate occasions. This will be aligned with when your child is studying the PLP. For students studying the PLP in Semester 1 the dates will be 3rd-7th July (Week 10 Term 2), and for those studying the PLP in the second semester the dates will be 4th-8th December (Week 8 Term 4).

For the current PLP students, paper work will be issued in Week 1 Term 2 and **must be** returned by no later than 29th May-2nd June (Week 5 Term 2). This will enable us to organise and complete worksite visits. It will also allow time for the students in PLP lessons to complete the mandatory training leading up to work experience. Given the increased departmental expectations, forms submitted after this date will not be accepted.

It is not advised students organise work experience outside of these times. We understand some situations require flexibility, so if you have a concern please contact your child's PLP teacher, Year Level Manager Leanne Wait or myself, Glen Williams, VET Coordinator.

Flex/FLO

The Flex Centre is in full operation benefiting FLO (Flexible Learning Options) students, ATSI students and mainstream students on alternative programs. Whilst the Centre is about Flexible Learning, we still place an emphasis and prioritize gaining SACE accreditation for our FLO students. Our expectation is that each student will enrol in all compulsory SACE subjects, including PLP, English, Maths and Research Project. Many students are also enrolled in external courses to allow successful completion of the SACE, including Welding, Agriculture, Diesel Mechanics, Food and Hospitality and Business Administration.

Each year since our Centre was opened, we have seen remarkable increases in completion of these subjects. With the subject success also comes outstanding results in attendance data. The Centre is specifically staffed with subject times and then timetabled for students to attend during these lesson times.

Our Building Program has gone to new levels with the successful completion of our own rendered barbecue area which allows our students the opportunity to cook sausage sizzles for school events where required and assist with community based events.

Miss George continues to impress with her Art/Craft projects which the students (both male and female) enjoy. Currently they are quilting and the students are looking forward to taking their projects home. Thank you to those community members who kindly donated old sewing machines to allow the project to get underway.

Our After-School Homework Club is also providing incredible benefits to students. Many subject assessment tasks are completed and the students are extremely grateful for the after-hours program.

Year 7 Technology - 'A Chook's Life'

Can you think of 10 reasons why a chicken cannot be a fish, or perhaps you'd rather design and build exercise equipment for a feathered fitness fanatic? Whichever challenge you choose, you'd be thinking about chickens in a way you probably never had before.

This is what our Year 7 students had been doing in the lead up to the arrival of 100 day-old chicks last week. Combining parts of Science, Technology, Mathematics, English and The Arts, 'A Chook's Life' is a multi-faceted blended learning unit which we use to help students transition from Primary Years into Middle School with independent, cooperative and interdependent learning activities in an iPad rich learning environment.

Considerable negotiation around task design helps ensure students can influence the nature of their learning and the way they present it. Organisation is essential, as deadlines need to be met and resources shared. Families have become involved in designing and constructing chook houses that defy description in their detail and unique solutions to design problems.

Daily data collected on chick growth rates and milestones will later be used in our 'ChickStats' statistics and graphing tasks. Imprinting, hygiene and safety have been essential parts of students' interaction with their birds.



We thank the Harris family of Gumview Park Farm for their efforts in organising and coordinating the collection and delivery of the precious chicks and for the donation of starter food.

This week Year 7 students will share their learning with other classes in 'Book a Chook' sessions and after this, the chicks go home. The chirping will be missed but we'll invest time looking at how we can improve the program for 2018 and find more ways to enrich the learning our students engage in.

Stage 2 Outdoor Education Kayak Camp

On Monday 20 March the Stage 2 Outdoor Education class travelled to Berri to begin a three-day Kayak journey through the Katarapko Creek region. The camp was the culmination of several weeks of preparation and the first of three trips required for the subject.

After an early start and a four hour drive, the students were well and truly ready to hit the water. The weather had turned it on for the start of the trip, 35 degrees and a slight breeze.

From our start at Bookpurna Cliffs we meandered down the river and into the Ajak Achilles Lake. After giving way to a snake, cooling itself in the water, we paddled into Lock Four before heading down the Murray to find camp.

After much deliberation the group found a beautiful area to camp, with a sandy beach and nice flat ground. We spent some time swimming and practising our paddling strokes, before cooking dinner.

The second day we carried our kayaks around a weir and paddled down Katarapko Creek. As we wound our way downstream, we stopped regularly for a swim and a drink of water, ensuring we remained cool in the searing heat.

The second campsite was as good as the first. After setting up our tents we headed back to the water for further practise before completing a skills test.

The final morning, we were greeted by cooler, more overcast conditions. After a 45 minute paddle we rejoined the Murray just out of Loxton. A quick paddle downstream and we arrived at our bus. Once the kayaks were clean, we settled into our seats and commenced the long journey home.

The camp proved to be very enjoyable and successful. The students improved their skills and their understanding of risk management. The next trip is a bushwalk in Week 6 Term 2.



A Mayoral Reception, an excursion to Gorge Wildlife Park to hold a koala and a visit to Adelaide, and a host family bonfire are just some of the highlights during the two-week visit. A Year 10 information session next Thursday during morning Care Group will gauge interest in this year's program.

'Bullying No Way Day'

Friday 17 March was 'Bullying No Way Day', a day where anyone who has dealt with people who bully (past or present), can speak up and speak about their experiences without being judged. Kadina Memorial School does not tolerate bullying of any kind, but sometimes it is hard to tell when a student is dealing with other mean students and may not want to speak up, therefore on this day we make it easier. KMSC organized activities for students to participate in. These activities help students learn but also make it fun at the same time.

The main focus this year was cyber bullying. Cyber bullying is when a person, or a group of people, target a specific person or group online. It can be all types of things, from saying mean things about them for others to see, or making a fake profile of that person. People often cyber bully because it is behind a screen, and nothing is being said to a person's face. Cyber bullying is easy to trace, and people rarely get away with it for long.

Primary students had an opportunity to write a message about bullying on a big sheet of paper. Some quotes included 'be cyber safe', 'don't bully because that's not awesome', and 'stay safe online'. There was also a 'pin the app on the phone' game, which was just like 'pin the tail on the donkey', but with a 'Bullying No Way Day' app instead.

In Middle School, students were shown videos about staying safe online and the extreme effects of not being careful. We also used a 'Bullying No Way Day' geofilter on Snapchat, available to use on the day from 8am to 4pm. A geofilter is a filter you are able to put on a picture in a certain location, mainly on the social media app Snapchat. The filter was organised by Senior KMSC and was used to spread positive messages. There were also a few posters put up around the school, with quotes such as 'make sure to taste your words before you spit them out' and 'bullying never has to do with you, it's the bully who has the issue'. Wristbands were organised by KMSC and issued to each student in the school for them to wear proudly on the day.

We hope spreading awareness for this day will encourage people who are struggling to step forward, and decrease bullying, including online abuse.
