Unit News

Learning independence through functional life skills is an important part of the Unit curriculum. Knowing basic cooking skills and preparing budget food is the focus of our weekly cooking lessons.

In the Senior class each week a student takes their turn to help set up the kitchen tables and chairs, prepare the ingredients and utensils for the recipe of the week.

Throughout the lesson students take turns to cut up the ingredients, measure, pour, mix as well as wash and dry the dishes, wipe down tables and pack tables, chairs and utensils away at the end of the lesson.

At the beginning of the year the students learn about safety and hygiene in the kitchen, focussing on safety when using utensils and electrical equipment, being careful around hot appliances and the importance of hand washing, wearing aprons and listening to instructions. These rules are reiterated at the beginning of each cooking lesson.

Often the program for cooking lessons each week is based on the Term theme or important events at the time. So far this term with our 'Seasons' theme, the students have made fruit skewers and fruit rockets. Also with Pancake Day recently, the students thoroughly enjoyed making and eating pikelets and pancakes.

Senior School: Meningococcal B Vaccine Herd Immunity Study

The licensed Meningococcal B vaccine (Bexsero) is being offered to all Year 10, 11 and 12 students in 2017 at our school by Kadina Medical Associates staff as part of the South Australian B part of its Meningococcal B Vaccine Herd Immunity Study.

During 2017 – 2018 each participant will:

- Receive two doses of Meningococcal B (Bexsero) vaccine
- Complete two single page questionnaires (one if student is in Year 12)
- Have two throat swabs taken (one if student is in Year 12)
- Receive a \$20 iTunes card after having each throat swab

Immunisation packs were sent home to all eligible students

- It is important that you read the information contained in the pack before you provide consent for your child to take part in the study.
- The student is also required to provide their consent to participate in the study by signing and dating the consent form.

The vaccine is licensed in Australia and recommended for use in adolescents and toddlers.

- The Meningococcal B Vaccine is licensed in Europe, Canada and the USA where it is being used to protect children against Meningococcal B disease.
- Up to 25% of adolescents carry the meningococcal bacteria in their throat. While this may not cause illness to themselves, the adolescent has the potential to spread the bacteria which may cause disease in others.
- The study aims to determine whether the Meningococcal B vaccine has the additional benefit of preventing the spread of the meningococcus bacteria from person to person.

If you have any questions about this program, please contact the nurses at Kadina Medical Associates on 8821 3133 or the Immunisation section, SA Health, Monday to Friday, 8.30 am – 5pm on 1300 232 272.

All parents/legal guardians are requested to complete, sign, date and return the Consent Form, even if you do not consent for the student to take part in the study. If you did not receive a Meningococcal B Vaccine Herd Immunity Study pack from your child and you think your child may be eligible, please ring Kadina Medical Associates.

Please note: your child may have received a Meningococcal C vaccine as a child. This is different and

does not take the place of the Meningococcal B study and vaccine. The Meningococcal B vaccine is a vaccination that would only have been provided on a private script and would have cost you about \$150 a dose.

Year 10, 11 and 12 students who have opted to participate are scheduled for the Meningococcal B vaccine on Week 11, Tuesday 11 April and Thursday 13 April at school. This will be carried out by Kadina Medical Associates nurses.

10 years ago... you would not be reading this!



Ten years ago we did not recognize these logos. Fast forward a decade and what we see and do 'online' every day is a whole new ball game and students, of all ages, are at the forefront of this new 'virtual playground'.

Like anything, we need guidelines and understanding of proper usage, so that we are responsible users, constantly aware of our own safety and that of others.

In the last two weeks our Year 7, 8, 9 and 10 students have had year level sessions with Kadina SAPOL and CIB Detectives, outlining rights, responsibilities and the law when it comes to using electronic devices.

The following is a summary of recommendations for all users.

Use strong and varied passwords to prevent being hacked.

On Facebook restrict your information to friends only, thus reducing the risk of very public conversations and misuse of your private information. The test of who your real friends are: the people who you would wish a happy birthday on their birthday.

Understand by agreeing to use an app means you are providing police with any information in relation to misuse. It also means you no longer own the material, it is owned by that company and they have your permission to sell your information. Some apps have an age limit, if it is over 13 years of age, then know you are playing in a playground that can attract many older folk.

Four things to remember when online

Who's posted this? Are they reliable? Can I trust this source? Is it to be believed?

How did this information make its way to me? Is it a scam? Hack? Or a pop up?

Accuracy. Is it true or untrue?

Me. How does it make me feel, when I see material like this? How is it affecting me?

Senior Constable Rob Tucker reminded students that pornography under the age of 18 is illegal. Porn is not a form of sex education, it is unhealthy for people to think that pornography is normal sexual activity. Brevitt Senior Detective Davies informed students about sexting and the law. If a person is Under 18 years old and has a naked or semi naked photo it is illegal to take, send, possess or disseminate it. Asking for a nude is also an offence and so is sending one. Holding or sending this information is a form of child exploitation/pornography. Guilty of this event can result in being on the Australian National Child Offender Register. Consequences of this can be restricted travel, reporting to police on a regular basis regarding any changes in your life.

Online grooming is when an adult is intentionally establishing contact to start a sexual relationship. An adult only needs to suggest meeting for this to be illegal intent. Private message friends to prevent being stalked by creepy adults. Turn the chat function off while gaming with people you don't know. Preferably play games with only people you do know and trust.

To avoid scams use reliable sites with *https* or secure sites with the padlock sign.

Look for the blue tick if you are following celebrities.

Review your photos so that you are not giving away important information, like wearing a school or club uniform, showing where you live. Take a photo of yourself off your profile.

Take your 'geotag' locator off when you have finished with maps (time, location and date on a photo is too much information).

Think before you post... five things can happen: information can be **COPIED, FORWARDED, REPOSTED, SAVED or CACHED**. Consider what message you are sending. Would other members of your family think it is okay? Nothing ever completely disappears, once you post it, even if you delete it.

More and more employers are checking digital shadows before they employ someone. Check your own shadow, google yourself and see what fingerprint you are leaving behind.

SAPOL reminded students that hacking and jailbreaking are illegal, criminal offences.

If students are aware someone is using an electronic device to bully, send a message that they need to stop it, speak to the person who is being set up or bullied and let them know you are on their side, do not send on the abusive message, speak with a trusted adult to get things to change.

Thank you to our local police who gave us the information so we can make informed choices and stay safe online.

Year 4 to 6 students will attend a similar cyber safety session next term. Recognising cyber safety and awareness starts from the moment a child goes 'online'.

2017 Sports Day Update

There is an air of anticipation in the build-up to next week's two day Sports Day, Thursday 9 March (R-6) and Friday 10 March (7-12).

Trials for triple jump and high jump occurred on Tuesday this week, 1500 metres on Wednesday, with 100 metre trials scheduled for tomorrow, Friday 3 March. Please refer to your Term 1 calendar to check the age groups involved.

In addition the Sports Day program is included with this week's newsletter, and will be uploaded to facebook and Skoolbag.

The reserve days for Sports Day, should there be an extreme weather event, will be the following week on Thursday 16 March (R-6) and Friday 17 March (7-12). We will endeavor to inform families as soon as practical should either of the days be delayed with a revised program, or postponed.

Team captains have been busy with House chants rehearsed, primary students practising their marching and all students learning and improving their field, track and team events during Physical Education classes.



Sports Day Facts – did you know?

Where did our sporting House names originate? The Kadina Primary and Kadina Memorial High Schools Amalgamation Committee felt strongly the sporting tradition of both sites should be retained. Each had four sporting houses, KPS had **Heath**, **Crosby**, **Ferguson** and **Rose**, while KMHS had **Southwood**, **Chandler**, **Holder** and **Roach**. The decision was made to keep two houses from each school, with the heritage representing the geographical locations of our students. It was a difficult decision as sporting houses can be quite parochial, loyal and steeped in tradition. We've compiled a very brief description of our current House history.

1. **Heath** was named after Les (Larry) Heath, a well-known Barunga-Willamulka farmer, who ran a successful rural supplies and hardware business in Kadina. He was a Member of State Parliament in 1957 at the time of his death and remembered as a generous community person.
2. **Rose** was named after Mrs Mavis Rose (nee Martin), a dedicated and committed supporter of former Kadina Primary School various committees and events spanning decades.
3. **Southwood** is in honour of Dr Albert Ray Southwood who moved to the district with his family in 1895. He enlisted in the Australian Army Medical Corps, studied medicine at the highest levels, and established a private practice in Adelaide. In World War II he became Deputy Director of Medical Services, 4th Military District with the rank of Colonel. In 1924 he donated the Southwood medal to Kadina Memorial High School celebrating country education.
4. **Chandler** is named after Mr Alfred Chandler, a local carpenter and hardware store owner in Wallaroo. He was a respected family and community person who also served as Mayor of Wallaroo in the mid 1920s.

Sports Day Fast Facts:

1. The first KMS Sports Days were held in 2013 and won by **Rose**.
2. **Heath** has won the overall Sports Day Cup three consecutive times – three in a row – trifecta. Chandler and Rose jostled for a close second.
3. **Chandler** holds the most records (4) for the Corner Spry across all age groups.
4. **Rose** leads the 4x100 metre relay championship record across all age groups: **Rose** (4); **Southwood** (3); **Heath** (2); **Chandler** (1)
5. **Southwood** reigned supreme at KMHS for a time, winning the shield several (7) years in row, from 2000 to 2006. Watch this space – a decade later it may just be Mighty Southwood's time in 2017.

KMS Sports Wrap

Knock Out Cricket Hit'n'Miss

Year 8/9 and Year 10 Knock Out cricket teams enjoyed mixed results against Whyalla in Port Pirie Last week (Tuesday 21 February).

The Year 8/9 game, played at Globe Oval, began with Kadina winning the toss and electing to bat on a pitch that was wet enough to resemble a slip'n'slide. Dylan Bradman (formerly known as Dylan Branford) was in sublime form crafting a chanceless 50 (65 Balls) before retiring to rapturous applause from both teams. Trent McCauley also chipped in with a patient 34 (57 Balls) to help the team reach a competitive total of 6/163 from its 30 overs. In reply, Whyalla were never in the hunt. An early wicket to Jordan Taylor (1/4 off 2 overs) and accurate bowling from Dylan Branford (2/10 off 3 overs), Jack Rowntree (2/5 off 1.2 overs) and Josh Taylor (2/1 off 2 overs) saw Whyalla dismissed for 50. The Year 8/9 team now progress to the final of this competition to be played in the coming weeks.

The Year 10 team forged on to Senate Oval and were briefly unable to locate the pitch on which they were meant to be playing. Eventually, Mr Hewett pioneered a path through the long grass, located the pitch and the game was able to begin. Whyalla won the toss and elected to bat posting a more than competitive 6/148 from their allotted 20 overs. Jakeb Branford bowled with the precision and control of a fighter pilot early creating multiple catching chances and limiting the Whyalla scoring. As the innings wore on the old adage, 'Catches win matches' rang true. A series of missed opportunities proved costly for Kadina gifting the opposition many extra lives. When faced with the daunting prospect of chasing 148, the boys needed everything to go right. A horrendous start saw them crash to 6/20 after 8 overs. A fighting 21 Not Out from Cooper Thiele and some charity from the opposition (contributing 15 extras) allowed Kadina to creep to 6/70 by stumps, falling 78 runs short of their target.

Drae was mentored by national champions, including Rio 2016 Paralympian Torita Isaac, long jumper Robbie Crowther and national 110m hurdles record holder Kyle van der Kuyp during the four-day event. The mentors shared their athletic journeys and how their success and positive mindset assisted them to excel in all areas of life. They encouraged participants to pursue life-long learning, including secondary and tertiary education and to continue their participation in and enjoyment of athletics.
