# understanding your child's report

### From the Principal's Desk

Student report writing is well underway with reports due home in Week 10 at the conclusion of Semester One.

Often regarded as the 'Business End' of term this report reflects student learning achievement, effort and attendance over a significant period of time.

The recent Pupil Free Day was an opportunity for educators across the Northern Yorke Partnership to collaborate and assess what constitutes a particular subject grade when referring to the Australian Curriculum (AC).

This is called moderation and ensures student subject grades are allocated in line with the AC, regardless of which school they attend.

Student Services Officers across the NY Partnership also attended training and development on the PFD.

These days are extremely important as they enable staff to collaborate, plan, set goals, network, share knowledge from all of the sites and continue lifelong learning.

Thank you for supporting us on the PFD, as it was very timely with report writing and deepens our understanding of the AC.

As a parent/carer/guardian of Reception to Year 11 students you will receive two reports each year. These reports help understand how your child is progressing and how we as a team can support your child's development and learning.

Year 12 students will receive a 'progressive report' at the end of Term 2, with a grade and teacher comment. The grade received is NOT the final one.

Teachers plan, teach, assess and report students' learning using the Australian Curriculum (AC). The AC sets high standards for what all young Australians should be taught and what they should know and be able to do as they progress through school. Reports are just one way schools

communicate with you about how your child is progressing at school.

All South Australian schools provide two reports each year that:

- · Report on all subjects studied
- Are based on a 5-point achievement scale
- Use plain language

Years 1 to 10 student reports are based on the A to E achievement scale, supported by a description of what this means in relation to their progress against the achievement standard.

Reports for Reception students use descriptive wording about students' progress over the year.

### How do teachers allocate grades?

Teachers use a range of different assessment strategies and tools to gather evidence of student achievement with reference to the achievement standards in the AC. Based on the evidence, teachers make an on-balance judgement to decide which grade best matches the standard the student has achieved. Teachers are not expected to allocate a set number of each grade within their class.

# What other forms of reporting do schools provide?

Schools communicate with families about their child's learning in a variety of ways including parent-teacher interviews, emails and phone calls. We encourage you to contact your child's teacher any time you have a concern regarding their learning and make a mutually convenient time to meet. Likewise, communication is key with teachers adopting a 'no surprises' policy should your child receive a below standard grade. Teachers are keen to work with families to provide the best opportunity for student learning improvement.

Student reports will go home with the Newsletter in Week 10, Thursday 6 July.

### ATTENDANCE STRATEGY - 'Attend To Attain'

As part of an ongoing focus across the school to improve the attendance of all students, two initiatives have had significant success in the Flex Centre.

Firstly, creating a *FLEX Centre Home Group* during morning and afternoon Care Group times has given a small group of FLO students a place to 'call home' on arrival and get organised for their days at school. This Care Group is supervised by Mrs Jacq Barry and students are responding positively to the Care Group being there for them.

Secondly, students who appear on this Care Group Roll have their daily attendances recorded on the white board in the Flex Centre. *Thorough records of their continuous days of attendance (or 'streaks')* are kept by Bruce Woodcock.

Students have become competitive about maintaining their 'streak'. This has seen some excellent increases in student attendance within the FLO-Flex Centre world.

There have been some outstanding efforts from some students this term with Jordan and Tamieka being here for every day (100%) of their modified timetables, and Jake achieving an amazing 92%.

We are all extremely proud of their efforts. The more they are attending, the more they are attaining their learning.


### **Disability Unit**

Using the Jolly Phonics program is the focus of the Unit literacy curriculum this year. The students are thoroughly engaged as they participate in a variety of multi-sensory activities including using the SMART Board and rhymes to learn the letter sounds and blends to support their reading programs. They have also enjoyed practising to form and write the letters correctly using the multi-sensory approach.

Learning about the tricky words is also a component of Jolly Phonics. This helps support the learning of words that do not follow the general pattern of sounding out for correct pronunciation. Alongside class learning, is the support of families to work with students for short periods of time at home to say their letter sounds and tricky words to consolidate what has been taught at school.

The students are now writing words using the letter sounds that have been taught and are very proud of their book work.
