Principal's Report

Reconciliation Week was a vibrant celebration of Indigenous culture and history, with the unveiling of an R-12 piece of artwork featuring 1,200 individually designed popsticks also epitomizing Kadina Memorial School's values.

The colourful artwork was the centre piece of a Whole School Reconciliation Assembly in the Heart of the School on Monday 29 May.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students, who ran the Assembly in its entirety, spoke about their heritage and landmark political anniversaries such as the Mabo decision.

Public speaking is a skill and for many it is a daunting experience and I congratulate all of the students involved who stepped out of their comfort zones to talk in front of peers and special guests.

The lessons of Reconciliation Week go beyond a designated week on the yearly calendar.

It's about respect for people, culture, history and genuinely working together to unite as a community.

The artwork is a beautiful example of what can be achieved if we all have a common goal.

Each student and staff member was given a blank popstick. They were briefed about aboriginal designs and symbols, which they individually decorated. Students discovered their one popstick became a kaleidoscope of mass colour when joined with others.

Ms Karen George had the painstaking job of assembling the popsticks, with Mr Andrew McDonald and Mr Al Woods making the frame and plaque. Aboriginal Education Teacher Mrs Janine McKay and Aboriginal Education Officer Nigel Raymond initiated and managed the project. Thank you all.

If you haven't seen the artwork please visit the Front Office. Students aged from Reception to Year 12 are constantly pausing to try and find their one popstick!

The artwork is quite a talking point and as educators this is exactly what we strive to achieve. It means the messages we discussed in class have transferred to everyday life.

Powerful learning was embedded across the curriculum. Dreamtime stories provided rich literacy opportunities as children read, wrote, created and discussed moral meanings associated with this genre: respect, opportunity, excellence as well as responsibility for one's actions and helping others in need. It's called lifelong learning.

Public Education Awards

Nominations for these awards often come from students, their families and colleagues who believe the staff member has consistently gone 'above and beyond' to deliver education and support across the breadth of our school environment.

Linking Learning Locally Grant

Building an extensive community network with one-onone mentoring for Middle School students is a key initiative of the \$90,000 Linking Learning Locally grant.

The program will develop learning opportunities within our community for students who attend a FLO program. It recognises the immense contribution, skill and expertise our local businesses, service groups and agencies provide to assist young people to re-engage in the community, increase connections and develop lifelong social and work skills. In addition, families will be offered parallel learning opportunities to participate in relevant courses with specific coaching to build on their child's learning. This is an exciting opportunity to develop meaningful learning for children considered at risk. Northern Yorke Partnership's feeder primary schools will be invited to identify Year 7 students who would benefit from this program.

Pupil Free Day

Network Learning Groups (NLG) involving educators across the NY Partnership will form part of the Pupil Free Day (PFD) program next Tuesday 13 June. This is a valuable opportunity for teachers to share, explore, implement and reflect on various areas of their practice. NLGs, specialised learning driven by a collaborative group, ignite creativity, inspire thinking and challenge mindsets.

The second part of the PFD will be collaborative moderation to ensure consistency of expectations and assessments across all year levels. This enables staff to discuss, assess and have a common understanding of student progress, development and standards.

Kadina Memorial staff participate in a range of training and development workshops throughout the year, often in their own time. Below, Agricultural teacher Charlie Bensen featured recently in the Stock Journal at an Agricultural Teachers' Conference.

Sub School News

R-6 Corner

In my conversations with parents and caregivers I am often asked how they can support their child/ren with their learning. This week I have spent time gathering some ideas - hope they help.

Talk with your child about what's happening at school. Ask about activities, topics, what they are learning or what they found interesting or fun in their day. Talking like this helps them believe in themselves and gain confidence.

Ask specific questions to draw out information – instead of 'yes' or 'no' questions, try open questions that encourage discussion.

- How do you think you went with your maths or reading today?
- What made you laugh today?
- Who did you see being a helper today?
- What was the most interesting thing you did today?

Keep trying, even if the answers are 'good' or 'nothing'! Find out what your child's favourite subjects are and what they are learning about. Try to make connections between what they are learning at school and everyday life, such as practising reading and counting at the shops.

Talk with your child about current issues and ideas. Exploring big ideas together is a way to get children thinking critically and being curious about how things work. Children can enjoy learning and putting their thoughts into words.

Ask about friendships and relationships at school. Get to know who their friends are and how they spend their break times.

Talk about your own learning — tell your child about what you are currently learning or what you remember about being their age. Share the message that learning is important at all ages. Explain how you plan, solve problems and think about the future.

When families and schools work together, children are more likely to build good relationships and do better at school. These are simple things you can do at home to help your child to be their best.

Year 3 Ceramics

At Kadina Memorial School Year 7 students complete a term each of Visual Art, Drama and Music as part of the National Arts Curriculum. In Visual Art students learn basic colour theory and painting techniques as well as a unit of work on ceramics. Clay techniques such as pinch pots, coil pots and hand building are used to create finished pieces with an audience in mind. Students use the design, make and appraise process to produce their functional pen pots, animal sculptures and pinch pot monsters. We are fortunate to have good quality kiln at Kadina Memorial School and these pieces are glaze fired to 1,100 degrees Celsius.

She was most impressed by their selfmanaged behaviour, tone quality and presentation skills.






























Sport News

Year 8/9 KO Footballers Kick On

The Kadina Memorial School Year 8/9 Knockout Football Team has again flexed its muscle on Yorke Peninsula, winning Round 1 and 2 of the state-wide Knock Out Football Competition.

Game one pitted Maitland Lutheran School against Kadina. Kicking to the southern end of Maitland Oval, Kadina powered to a 6 goal lead in the first half, holding their compatriots from down the peninsula scoreless. Deployed in a new roll up forward, Nathan 'Bulldog' Perkins burrowed through the packs to a career high 3 goal haul. Braidon Cunningham was Dangerfield-like winning plenty of football and hitting the scoreboard, ably supported by workhorses Charlie Adams and Brock Thomson who rarely wasted a disposal. Angus Hunter-Price provided a focal point in the front half snagging 3 majors. After half time the one-way traffic continued, with Kadina continuing its route, piling on 7 more goals to eventually run away with an 87-point win.



Kadina backed up their earlier performance with another hard fought victory in game two. The Yorke Peninsula team provided a tough contest using their supreme foot skills to force many early forward forays. Kadina's dour defence led by Jordan Taylor, Alex Elsworthy and Connor Russell limited the early scoreboard damage. As the game wore on, Kadina began to make its presence felt, using its superior size and spread of quality personnel to stretch its lead. Dylan Branford sparked the scoring with brilliant individual play to change the momentum of the game. The second half was an arm wrestle. It took ten minutes to break the deadlock with some Eddie Betts style finishing from Adams extending the margin to 14 points. Again, Cunningham, Adams and Thomson led from the front, or in their case the middle, to give Kadina many forward entries, with the weight of numbers eventually paying off. Some nervous moments came with back to back YP goals but majors to Matt Borlace and another to Cunningham saw the margin creep back out to a comfortable 20-point win.

As a result of the performances, the team will march on to the next round of the competition to be played early next term. The well rounded team displays drove the on field success achieved and should this continue there is reason to expect the boys will be a good chance to take the next step.


