### From the Principal's Desk

'Sustainability' is a concept taught across all learning areas and subjects as part of the Australian Curriculum.

At Kadina Memorial School we have many examples of students exploring the environment through explicit learning opportunities and play.

The recent Reception to Year 2 Outdoor Play afternoon provided Early Years students an opportunity to 'work' with nature to create their artwork and games. Battling the natural elements, such as the sheer power of the wind lifting a large parachute into the air, was a teachable moment for natural energy. The Year 5 Kitchen Garden has been a hive of activity all year round, with vegetables and herbs harvested regularly and used in cooking. Seeds and seedlings donated by the community has allowed students to study plant cycles, soil health, natural nutrition, the science of cooking, as well as developing healthy lifestyle habits and skills. Middle School STEM leaders have been working together to develop a whole school litter project. Litter is a world-wide problem and our school is not immune, with packaged food a common item in school lunch boxes. It is exciting to see young minds collaborating to make a difference to their community, reducing the litter load and educating their peers for a better future.

Senior Agricultural and Horticultural students created a culinary delight with

their 'Paddock to Plate' assessment late last term. As the title suggests, students planned, prepared and delivered a meal using the produce they had personally grown in Ag. (Continued page 2)

### Sustainability across the Curriculum (page 1)

Sustainability education is futures-orientated, focusing on protecting environments, creating a better world for all to enjoy. Importantly, students become global citizens.

# **Sub School News**

### **R-6 Corner**

In Term 3, Miss Smart's Year 5 has been busy in the garden and in the kitchen. In the kitchen we went back to basics and have been making bread from scratch. We started with bread rolls. We learnt about how yeast works and tested our patience and resilience throughout the making process. Once we had this mastered we added fresh herbs and vegetables from our garden to make spinach and cheese pull apart, spinach, bacon and spring onion scrolls and different flavours of bread rolls. We also used fresh kale from our garden to make kale, banana, pear smoothies. We thought they were going to be gross but they were delicious!

In the garden the class harvested all of the produce, bunched up all the herbs and vegetables to sell. All of the produce was sold in the Kadina Memorial staff room for a gold coin donation. The proceeds are going straight back into our garden and cooking. We have now planted summer seeds ready to repeat the process all over again and enjoy some different fruit and vegetables in the kitchen this term.

### **Unit News**

Last term we learnt about the Five Senses, but did you know we actually have eight! The three you may not be as familiar with are Proprioception (the internal senses of the body that come from the joints, muscles, ligaments, and other connective tissue), Vestibular Processing (the system that helps you to detect changes in regards to gravity) and Interoception. Interoception is an internal system, which makes us aware of our bodies, both physical and emotional. It tells us for example if we are angry or upset, when we need to go to the toilet, if we are feeling too hot or cold, if our heart is beating fast or if we are hungry or thirsty. Another way of thinking of it is having an awareness of our bodies.

In the Junior Class we have been doing some interoception based activities two to three times a day for five minutes. Activities include stretching our hands or our bodies out like stars, giving ourselves hugs, curling our toes into balls, and taking deep breaths by pretending to smell a flower and then blow out a candle. This has been a great way to transition between activities and also a good activity to do when students return to the classroom from recess and lunch.

We have also turned the small room in our class into the Break Room. Throughout the day if students feel the need, they can make a request to go into the Break Room. Students then select three interoception activities to do. This might be doing star jumps, slithering like a snake or blowing bubbles. After a two to five minute break, students return to the activity they were doing, and are usually calmer and ready to finish their work.

### Middle School: Attendance Matters

School attendance matters BIG time, as Mr Hewett's Year 9 class discovered last term and shared with their peers at the Middle School Assembly.

Students analysed their year level attendance figures during a maths problem solving lesson and interpreted how this impacted on schooling as well as what it would mean in the workforce.

They investigated Kadina Memorial's attendance target of 95% and discovered if they had entered the workforce they were allowed 10 sick days per year. If there were 200 school days and they had 10 days absent they would have an attendance rate of 95%.


We would like to share some of their findings:

- The highest Care Group attendance was 92.3%
- The lowest Care Group attendance was 88 %
- 122 Year 9's had missed 1,677.5 days of school for the year so far in 2017, averaging 14 missed days per student.
- In the workforce, this equated to four extra 'sick' days unpaid with another 60 school days left in the year.
- They calculated that at this rate it was likely students would miss 20 days this year.
- If students were to miss 20 days from Reception to completing Year 12 they would miss 260 days of school.
- 260 missed days equals one full school year plus a term and a bit.

This in-depth analysis resonated with students. They asked their peers to think about how it felt when they missed a double lesson and how difficult it was to catchup. The task was designed to give students ownership on their attendance.

Mr Hewett's class reported: 'It is our teacher's job to provide us with engaging and fun learning tasks but it is our responsibility as students to make sure we are at school, on time and in the right frame of mind to learn.' Wise advice and another example of explicit and meaningful learning in Middle School.

Ten Year 7 and Year 8 students participated in the day's program with like-minded students from Port Augusta Secondary School on Tuesday 29 August.

We heard from guest speakers who talked about local issues they deal with in their profession and the challenges they face solving these.

Our challenge was to brainstorm ideas of how we could also help the local community.

Our favourite idea was a competition to see which sports day team could collect the most rubbish. This came about because we have noticed an increase in litter on the school's ovals and gardens. Rubbish pollutes the environment and is a poor reflection of our school. We would like to help solve this problem by looking further into the issue and creating a solution for the future.

We are currently working on how to solve this, but if you have any suggestions of action please see a member of the STEM team.


