Students setting goals allows them to choose where they want to go in school and what they want to achieve. Knowing this, they can concentrate on improving. Goal setting provides students long-term vision and short-term motivation.

Clearly defined goals students can measure allows them to determine and manage their learning journey and take pride in their achievements. They can see the steps in what might have seemed a long drawn out process.

The selection acknowledges Mr Rigby-Meth's dedication as an educator and exemplary role model of the highest calibre to his many students over the years.




Ascot Art Exhibition

Bushfire Season and Catastrophic Day

Families are encouraged to read the Bushfires and Your Child's School or Preschool brochure located at the DECD link:

This link provides resources about what their child's site will do on a catastrophic fire day or in the event of a bushfire.

At Kadina Memorial School on days of **catastrophic fire danger**, **no school buses or taxis will run**. The school will remain open. As the school may not receive notification of this until 4.00pm the day before, it is vitally important families have up to date mobile phone and email contacts recorded at the school or 'like' the Kadina Memorial School Facebook page and / or download the Skoolbag app for notifications.

If your child's school or preschool is open, but their bus or taxi service has been cancelled, you need to make your own travel arrangements. If your child is unable to attend because of the transport cancellation, you need to advise the school.

It is important all students know their own family bushfire plan. If a fire students are likely to know about it quickly and will become anxious if their family is likely to be affected. In times of danger, it is possible that incorrect information is transmitted. We need to maintain a state of calm whilst students are at school and the more they are aware of the plan, the easier it is to care for them.

Governing Council meets twice per term and contributes to the School's Site Improvement Plan, focus areas and events.

Here is a snapshot of a few of the initiatives discussed at last week's meeting:

- The Communications review Committee has drafted a Social Media Guideline to assist staff, students and families when considering posting images of students on social media.
- A School Photo Review team has endorsed Event Photography in 2018. Importantly R-12 photos will be held in Term 1, Week 1 over two days, from Thursday 1 February to Friday 2 February. Individual school photos and traditional Care Group photos will be taken during this time. The individual school photo will also be used for Year 7-12 student identification cards. Photo packages and payment details will be provided soon.
- Guest presenters Year 10 students Ethan Manners and Ashleah Walker spoke about the powerful impact of participating in the Youth Opportunities program.
- The school budget is tracking well with the Qkr app extended next year for the payment of Materials and Services fees, excursions and camps.
- Term 1 Pupil Free day will be held on Monday 29 January with all NY partnership educators attending an Understanding Poverty workshop. The first day of school will be <u>Tuesday 30</u> January, 8.30am.

Kadina Memorial's SAASTA P.A.R.T.Y.

In Australia, trauma is responsible for 40 percent of deaths in 15-25 year olds. Many more youths are disabled from injuries sustained from trauma situations. Much trauma is preventable, as it is often the result of a toxic combination of alcohol and/or drugs and risk-related behaviour.

These significant facts led Kadina Memorial School SAASTA students to become involved in the Prevent Alcohol & Risk-related Trauma in Youth Program (P.A.R.T.Y.). Students travelled to Lyell McEwin Hospital to gain a better understanding of the outcomes of risky decisions - decisions that can affect their lives forever. Doctors, nurses and emergency workers involved students in real-life experiences in the emergency and trauma units. Students also had the opportunity to meet two trauma survivors who shared their horrific stories which caused dramatic life changes. The hands-on. confronting and extremely powerful program transformed SAASTA students' thinking on risk related choices, as one choice could change your life, forever.



The P.A.R.T.Y program was very informative. We learnt that we need to think before we act and make choices. Without knowing the outcome, we are putting ourselves and others at risk of danger. *Mackenzie Weltman*

We got to experience real situations in the P.A.R.T.Y. program. We followed the path of a car crash victim, into an ambulance, emergency room, rehabilitation unit and even the morgue. We also experienced and discovered the effects the accident had upon family and friends. We learnt that you need to think carefully and make good decisions. *Talisha Lawrence*



The P.A.R.T.Y program was a very confronting experience and opened my eyes to the possibilities of how your life could change in one moment, due to one small mistake that could have been avoided. Overall it was enjoyable and I got to experience what it was like for patients that are unfortunate enough to have this happen to them.

Obtaining L's and P's

SAPOL's Road Safety Section recently attended Kadina Memorial School and delivered a road safety presentation to Year 10 students entitled, – A Guide to obtaining your L's and P's.

This was an interactive program discussing the methods of obtaining a driver's licence; the conditions relating to Learner and Provisional licences; the risks associated with driving; and why being a passenger in a vehicle driven by a young person is potentially risky.

The program included discussions on crash risks, speeding, alcohol and drugs, fatigue and driver attitudes to road safety.

Many thanks to Ms Haywood for a detailed, interesting and hands-on lesson.


School Magazine orders due soon
