I thank students, families and staff who attended ANZAC Day services and the Year 12's who made the annual pilgrimage to Melbourne's Shrine of Remembrance.

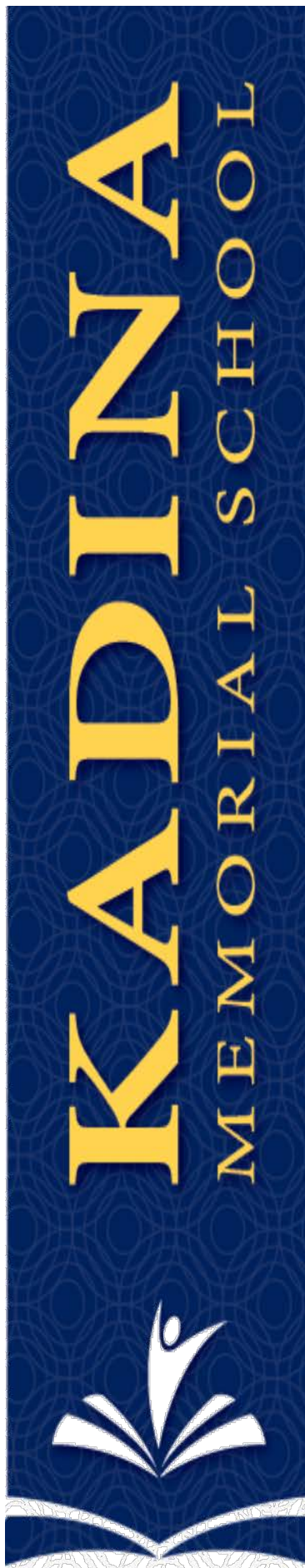

## Why NAPLAN is important

Whilst recently in the news NAPLAN has been criticised by some, as a school it can be used as a valuable data set by which school improvement can be driven. In the past schools have closely analysed the results to see which educational processes are working and which are not, allowing for many practices within the school to change for the better. Further to this, with each child gaining their own report, teachers and parents can see which areas the child may need to improve, enabling a teacher to tailor their program to suit this need.

It is therefore vital to recognise that the value of this data is increased when every student undertakes the testing process and attempts to complete it to the best of their ability. I therefore seek your support in helping the school to be able to gather the best possible data set that we can. Simple ideas such as talking positively about NAPLAN at home and encouraging your child to do their best will further enhance the authenticity of the results and help the school to be able to move further on its improvement journey.

Whilst NAPLAN can be daunting for both students and parents, every attempt is made to ensure students are comfortable and confident.

The Premier's Reading Challenge is a literacy engagement program, introduced in 2004, to improve literacy levels by encouraging students to read more books. The Challenge requires students to read 12 books between now and early September.

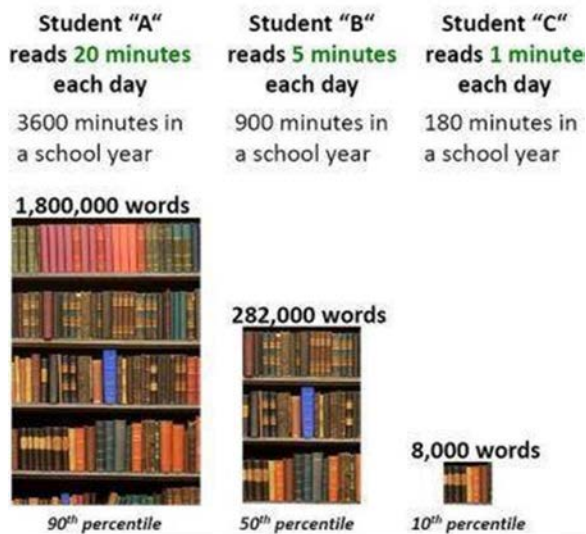
Our launch on Tuesday was a wonderful celebration of books, sharing and committing to achieving a goal. Learning to read is like learning to ride a bike or learning to swim: you need to be on a bike or in the water to do this. To learn to read and improve as a reader, reading regularly a variety of texts is critical. The infographic below details this clearly.

As a family never underestimate the time you spend encouraging daily reading, talking about books read, visits to the library, discussions around the tea table, conversations whilst travelling about signs, maps, destinations etc as these regular interactions have a massive effect for your child's reading skills development and their positive attitude to reading.

## Unit News

This term our integrated theme is Animals. During the course of the term we will be looking at Pets and Farm Animals in Weeks 1-5, and Wild Animals in Weeks 6-10. We are looking at the possibility of having an excursion to a farm later in the term, students caring for a pet in the classroom, as well as visiting the animals at our school Agriculture Centre. The students have already begun to read stories about animals as part of the literacy program and made animals in Art and Craft lessons.

A highlight of Tuesday afternoons for the remainder of the year will be the Students with Disabilities Extended Water Safety swimming lessons. This has been a long time coming but has definitely been worth the wait. The students always look forward to these lessons and thoroughly enjoy the time they can spend in the pool.

The majority of the younger students are able to have 1:1 instruction time which gives them lots of opportunity to focus on improving their confidence and gain valuable water safety skills. It is great to see the improvement each week of the students moving away from the edge of the pool and venturing further out into the middle as they gain trust in their instructor.

We are very grateful for the work that Debbie Terrett, Leanne Wait, Simone Mercer and Carol Saunders have put into making these lessons possible, and the four instructors who make themselves available each Tuesday to teach our students the skills necessary for them to be more confident in the water.

## STEM Connection Day

On Wednesday 4 April the Kadina Memorial School STEM team went on a field trip to a STEM connection day in Clare. When we got there we were welcomed by Brenton Wilson and Erin Matthews who hosted the event. First we discussed what STEM is, what it means to us and how it impacts on us all. The most enjoyable activities were hands-on. In one exercise we were given a bunch of items and to make a water filtration system. We built a mechanism to propel a ping pong ball more than two metres during another activity. We only had limited supplies and some of the supplies were to "throw us off". We achieved our goal by cutting a hole in the bottom of a big plastic cup, cutting up half the balloon and stretching it on to the end of the cup. We placed the ping pong ball in the cup and slingshot the ball where it made it past the two metre line. We finished off the day feeling very enthused to start learning STEM.

Students are investigating if the shorn wethers gain weight in a feedlot experiment compared to the fully fleeced wethers.

# Yorke Emerging Leaders

Two Kadina Memorial School staff members Bridget Johns and Hannah Dayman, who are supporting the Linking Learning Locally (LLL) project, have been selected to be part of the 2018 Yorke Emerging Leaders (YEL) Program.

The YEL Program has been designed to develop 16 local people to become leaders of tomorrow.

The program includes workshops, networking events, mentoring and community projects.

Bridget, who is the Linking Learning Locally Project Manager, said a key reason they were interested in completing the program was to meet and build relationships with other community members from across the Yorke Peninsula.

'We have completed two days of workshops and have already made new contacts with community members passionate about creating positive change which will support our Linking Learning Locally project,' she said.

The LLL project aims to support the social and emotional wellbeing of Middle School Students by linking them with mentoring and volunteering opportunities to enable positive experiences and connections with the wider community.

LLL has received a \$4,000 grant for a project involving "wheels" (bikes, scooters etc) and "art" (painting up to 13 stobie poles in front of the school) and 4 students are part of the Yorke Environmental Leaders Program.

Bridget said they were looking for more opportunities to provide students a sense of belonging, connection and purpose.

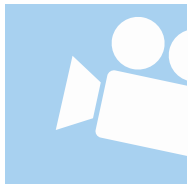

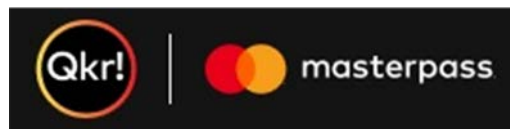
