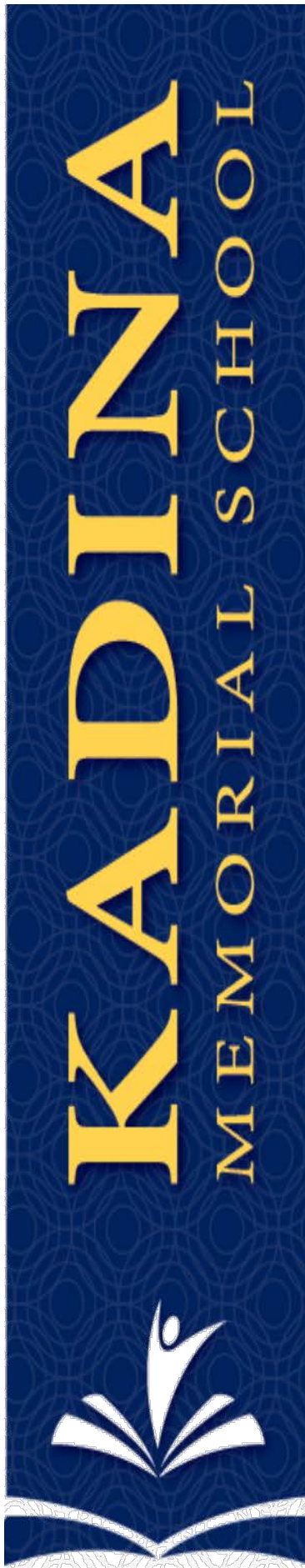

# Sub School News

## R-6 Corner: Parents really matter

A recent facebook link shared on our page of science journalist Helen Pearson, presenting at a TED talk where she shares some important findings and truths about life and good parenting is most revealing.

For the past 70 years, scientists in Britain have studied thousands of children through their lives to find out why some end up happy and healthy while others struggle. This longest-running study of human development in the world identified those children who succeed in life: that is enjoy the privilege of a happy and healthy life, were often those who had parents who were interested, invested and engaged in their children. Their actions include:

- Talking and listening to their child
- Responding to them warmly
- Taking them on trips and visits
- Teaching letters and numbers
- Reading to them every day

Children with parents who were reading daily to their five year olds and taking an interest in them at ten years of age were less likely to be in poverty at 30 years of age.

Interestingly children's bedtime routines significantly affect this. Children who go to bed at different times are more likely to have behavioural problems than those with regular bedtimes. Families of children with behavioural problems who have switched to regular bedtimes have frequently seen an improvement in their child's behaviour.

Parents and what they do is really, really important. ***Thank you for the time you spend talking with your children, showing genuine interest in what they are doing, taking them on local and wider trips to see/talk about/share experiences, restricting access to ICT and ensuring regular bedtimes, as what you are doing is significantly impacting on your child's long term health, wellbeing and happiness.***

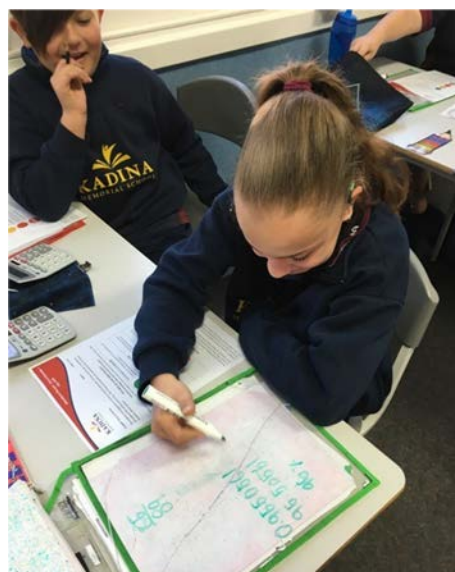
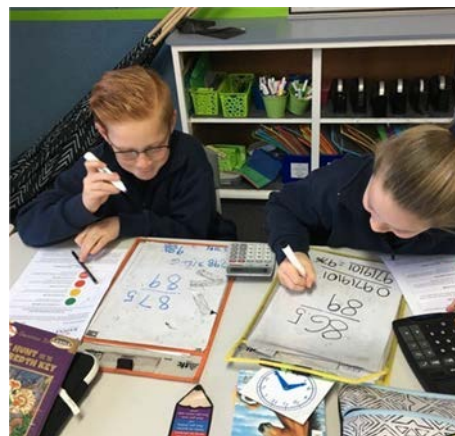

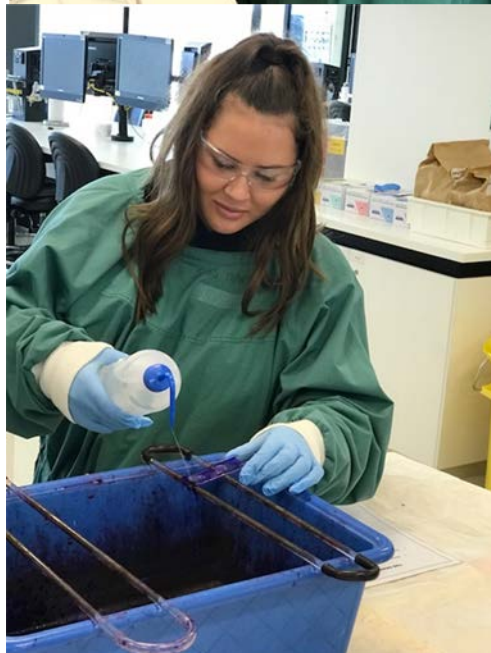


Students gained much knowledge from attending the SACE Aboriginal Pathways Conference and felt more inspired in working towards their life goals.

## Preparing Year 12 Students for the Future

At Kadina Memorial School, we provide many opportunities for Year 12 students to begin planning for their futures. From the end of Term 2, student commitments will begin to increase. It is suggested that families take note of the different events or opportunities that are being extended to students during the next five months as we assist them in preparing for life after school.

### Holiday Sessions

Many Year 12 teachers make themselves available to students during the Term 2 and Term 3 holidays. These sessions can be focussed on revision for exams or opportunities to complete practical work. Students are encouraged to attend school at these times as appropriate. Due to the timing of Ski Trip, the majority of sessions will be held in Week 1 of the Term 2 holidays and times have been negotiated between students and staff. Students are not required to wear uniform, however it would be appreciated if they let teachers know if they plan to attend. We thank those teachers who are giving up their own time to run the sessions and trust that students will take full advantage of this opportunity to hone their knowledge and skills.

### Year 12 Mid-Year Exams

Families are reminded that Year 12 Mid-Year Exams are being held on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of Week 1, Term 3. There will be no Year 12 classes running at this time. Students are required to only attend their exam at the Kadina Football and Netball Clubrooms. They are encouraged to arrive at least 15 minutes before the examination is scheduled to begin. Students are required to wear full Kadina Memorial School uniform and bring all required stationery in a clear plastic sleeve.

If any Year 12 student comes onto school grounds during these three days, sign-in and sign-out, behaviour and uniform rules apply. Students may elect to meet with teachers outside of their timetabled examination times catch up on any work not completed. This needs to be organised with the class teacher prior to the end of Term 2. The Year 12 Study Area will be available for students to use for individual work if catching a bus.

A Trial Examination for English Literary Studies will be held in August, as prepared by the SACE Board. A Trial Examination for General Mathematics will be held during the Term 3 holidays on school grounds.

### Year 12 Day

Following the success of the 2016 and 2017 events, a Year 12 Day has been organised for Thursday, Week 1, Term 3 at the Kadina Football and Netball Clubrooms. Based on the results of the Year 12 Wellbeing survey completed in Term 1, as well as feedback from previous attendees, the day covers information related to: Centrelink, Healthy Eating and Stress Management, SATAC Applications, Future Employment Pathways and the Encounter Youth 'Safety at Schoolies' presentation. The day is punctuated by activities in which the Class of 2018 will be pitted against each other for the final time as representatives of Chandler, Heath, Rose and (the Mighty) Southwood.

Students are reminded that school uniform is not required to be worn on Year 12 Day, however appropriate attire and footwear must be worn. Students need to bring their own Recess. Lunch is supplied for those who returned payment to the finance office before Friday, Week 8, Term 2.

### Destination Meetings

As part of the Kadina Memorial School wellbeing program, Year 12 students and their parents/caregivers are asked to attend a destination meeting with Senior Wellbeing Leader, Karm Kleinig during Term 3. At this meeting students will be asked to either complete their SATAC applications (if planning on continuing into Tertiary study) or their 2019 training and employment plan. A letter is included in the Year 12 Day booklet outlining how to book this meeting via the School Interviews portal. Copies will also be emailed to students on Friday, Week 1, Term 3.

### Year 12 Student Reference Letters

As part of the Kadina Memorial School Year 12 leavers process, any student who wishes to receive a School Reference Letter must submit a written request to Miss Tucker by Friday, Week 6, Term 3. A School Reference is written by a representative of the school and provides detail regarding a student's literacy and numeracy skills, application to set tasks, uniform appearance and punctuality, social skills and involvement in extra-curricular activities. Students who are entering into a vocational pathway and/or those who will not have a reference statement provided by an employer may find this document useful when applying for future employment. A letter is included in the Year 12 Day booklet outlining how to apply for this. Copies will also be emailed to students on Friday, Week 1, Term 3.

### Student Residential College Reference Letters

Students who are intending to apply to a residential college for 2019 will be required to submit an academic reference supplied by the school. In order to ensure continuity and to manage staff time, please only request these from Miss Tucker. It is appreciated if all requests are made via email and include a copy of the required criteria.

### Final Year 12 Meeting

There will be a final meeting held for all Year 12 students at 11am on Monday, Week 8, Term 3. During this meeting, students will be provided with information regarding the leaving process at Kadina Memorial School including final due dates, examinations, leavers forms, and the Year 12 Farewell Assembly. It is requested that all Year 12s attend this session as vital information is provided which will assist in the transition of students.

### Year 12 Farewell Assembly

All families of Year 12 students will be invited to the Farewell Assembly for the Class of 2018 held on Friday 2<sup>nd</sup> November, 2018. Please ensure that the postal and email addresses supplied to the school are accurate as RSVPs will be sent to families during Term 3.

### Year 12 Formal

Information regarding the Year 12 Formal will be made available during Term 3 by the student representatives on the 2018 Formal Committee. We thank Karm Kleinig and those students involved for the time that they have taken to organise this event.

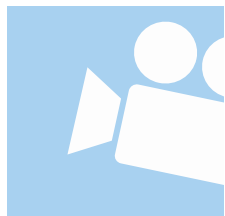
### Year 12 Mid-Year Exam Timetable 2018

#### Year 8 Ceramic Whistles

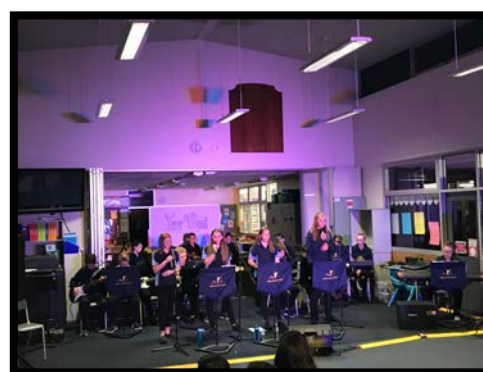

# Gallant in Defeat – 8/9 Knocked Out

The Kadina Memorial School Year 8/9 Knockout Football team has again been pipped by arch rivals Faith Lutheran College in Round 2 of this year's Secondary School Sport South Australia Year 8/9 Knockout Football competition. Off the back of a brilliant game 1 performance, the boys fell agonisingly short in game 3 of the round robin carnival at Clare.

Game 1 pitted Kadina against home side Clare High School. A flying start saw early ascendancy fall to the visitors with goal umpire Thomas Depledge getting a workout in the opening half much to his displeasure. Jack Rowntree was like a mouse on cheese picking off loose balls within the forward 50 before bombing the opening goal of the game from long range. Dylan Branford had his skates on and scythed his way through the defence to finish with two first half goals whilst Connor Knight took a different approach using his big frame to lope forward and hit the scoreboard. The game soon evened out with Clare venturing forward on several occasions only to be thwarted by defenders Will Neumann and Will McKay. This allowed Kadina to skip away to a 22-point half time lead. The second half emulated the first, as the midfield unit of Knight, Branford, Lachie Brook and Charlie Adams bullied their Clare opponents with ferocious attacks on the ball. Toby 'Plugger' Glasson got on the end of some skillful plays to finish with two goals whilst Branford added a third to his account. Kadina eventually ran out 44 point winners.

Faith Lutheran College comfortably defeated Clare in game 2 setting up a showdown in game 3 of the carnival. It was a cracker from the outset with both sides courageously throwing their bodies at the football. Although dominating possession in the opening half, Kadina managed to miss several easy opportunities allowing Faith to swoop and kick away to a 15-point half time lead. An inspiring half time rev up saw Kadina come out all guns a blazing. Charlie Adams played like a man possessed, single handedly lifting Kadina off the canvas and back into the contest. The opening bounce of the second half saw him burst through packs like Tarzan, before landing a long range goal to spark a frenzy amongst his team mates. Inspired by his captain, Angus Cock channelled his inner Gary Ablett to kick a miraculous goal from the boundary line before Glasson spun out of a pack to kick another miraculous goal. At this point, Kadina had hit the front with 13 minutes to play. The game seesawed between forward lines for the ensuing 10 minutes as bodies flew from every contest. With 5 minutes remaining, Faith managed several inaccurate scoring shots before a final mark and goal sunk the Kadina ship. Kadina fought out the contest but fell agonisingly short, eventually going down by 7 points.

Although they didn't get the result, the boys should be proud of the effort they displayed in adverse circumstances. Many players stood up to be counted when the pressure was on and again showed that as a school, Kadina is a measuring stick for their peers both academically and on the sporting field.
