Risk-taking is an important part of learning. Students need to be willing to both make and learn from them. They also need to challenge themselves to try new things, as these often lead to the greatest learning experiences.

If we think about our own lives, I wonder how many of our strongest learning experiences have come from when we have taken a great risk or challenged ourselves to do something that we weren't quite sure we could manage.

It is therefore important that we challenge our children with new events and take them beyond their comfort zone so they can truly be tested.

Kadina Memorial School offers our students so many extra-curricular activities designed to extend themselves, whether it be through the ICAS Maths and English Competitions, Knock Out or SAPSASA sporting events, the Science and Engineering Challenge, the Snow Trip or the World Challenge.

However, in their teaching, educators also offer challenges within the classroom, asking students to take on projects.

Japanese Homestay Program

Some of the greatest risk-takers I have met recently were the 10 young Japanese students who undertook the study tour to Kadina. These students are perfect examples of how taking risk can lead to strong learning experiences. Imagine the apprehension and worry that these 15 – 17 year olds felt, boarding the plane in Tokyo. They were going to a country where their grasp of the language was not strong and the culture would be different.

In Australia, we had 10 families waiting for a student they knew little about other than their life experiences were vastly different to their own.

Out of this however, both groups of people have learned so much and the stories I have heard from families who took in the students remind me why this program is such an important aspect of Kadina Memorial School.

I would like to thank all students and their families who embraced the challenge of having someone new in their home. I am sure it was a rewarding experience.



Science and Engineering Challenge

A wide array of challenges were presented to Kadina Memorial School students by the University of Newcastle which presented the Science and Engineering Challenge at the CCSLC. Other schools at this event included Port Broughton Area School and Moonta Area School.

The day was hosted, supported and judged by the Kadina Rotary Club. They presented challenges on the fundamentals of engineering and problem solving which included creating the most efficient path through a network, designing a prosthetic hand using string to pull and push fingers made from straws, designing a bridge to support a weighted car, creating a small rover to traverse bumpy terrain, building resource efficient furniture and using lights and optical fibre to create a unique code to communicate with. The Science and Engineering Challenge helped further our understanding of how important engineering is and how broad and different its applications are for the future.

National Tree Day





Qkr!

Cancelling lunch orders that have already been paid for

To cancel a food order from your itemized eReceipt:

- 1 Sign into your Qkr!™ account and scroll down to 'My Receipts' section
- 2 Select eReceipt for order you wish to cancel
- 3 You will see a red circle containing the 'minus' symbol beside your child's photo. Tap this. A pop-up box will appear asking if you wish to proceed. Tap 'Yes'
- 4 If your eReceipt contains food orders for more than one child, you will need to cancel one by one.

OR

To cancel a food order from the calendar view:

- 1 Sign into your Qkr! account and go to calendar view for food orders
- 2 Select date for which you wish to cancel order
- 3 Tap 'Cancel Items' on the pop-up box which appears
- 4 Another pop-up box will appear asking if you wish to proceed. Tap 'Yes'

To reduce school costs, cancelled food orders are refunded in the form of credit for future orders. A 'Refunded' stamp will appear on your eReceipt confirming that the order has been cancelled and a credit is available for future food orders. The value of any outstanding food order credits will automatically be deducted from your next Qkr! food order.

Please contact your school office directly to cancel any other (non-food) school payments. These refunds need to be processed through the school office according to school policy.
