Keeping children safe

Learning occurs through every life experience both at school and at home.

It is how individuals deal with these experiences which will have the greatest impact, with children and young people requiring guidance to make sense of their environment, understand and assess potential risks and know who to trust.

Throughout the school day a student will interact with their peers, staff, volunteers, and other adults at school pick-up and drop-off time and anyone they come into contact with after hours.

When you think about it they could potentially see, meet and talk to many people of all ages in a myriad of scenarios, this includes when children are walking or riding their bicycles to school or for fun on the weekend. As a parent I often talk through with my children various scenarios, such as what to do if a car stops and a person approaches you or if person makes you feel strange or scared. Children are mostly trusting and while we don't want to alarm or hover over a child's sense of freedom we do need to guide them and give them some practical tools should they ever feel threatened at any time.

The Department for Education has a legal responsibility to protect children and young people at school and in the wider community.

Principal's Report continued:

Keeping children safe

Teachable moments are captured and embedded during class and in the playground daily, with a child safety program called 'The Keeping Safe: Child Protection Curriculum (KS:CPC)' taught to all Reception to Year 12 students every year.

The KS:CPC, delivered at age appropriate levels, has four key focus areas which includes every child has a right to be safe, relationships, recognising and reporting abuse, and protective strategies.

As a school community we have a legal responsibility to ensure all children and young people have a right to:

- be treated with respect and to be protected from harm
- be asked for their opinions about things that affect their lives and to be listened to
- feel and be safe in their interactions with adults and other children and young people
- understand as early as possible what is meant by 'feeling and being safe'

With this in mind, it is important to contact the school or police immediately if you genuinely feel your child, or you observe another child, is in a potentially unsafe situation at any time.

Living in a country community we are fortunate to 'look out' for each other and protect our children and young people.

Remember, we were all young once, vulnerable, and needing guidance when growing up to become well-rounded and respectful citizens.

R-6 Corner: Reading successes

Book Week was a wonderful celebration of the special powers of literature. During the week some other special news became evident as many years 3-6 students sat the Literacy Pro 'big test' to determine their reading progress in the previous 10 weeks. Concurrently the Early Years staff continually assess students reading levels.

The great news was many, many, many wonderful success stories with improvement in students' reading levels/scores. When I ask students what has contributed to this a pattern emerges:

- **Regular school attendance.** Being at school each day, on time makes learning easier to grasp and achieve.
- **Regular reading at school and at home.** These students read most nights, organise themselves to swap their books, visit the library to gain new books and often read other books/newspaper/magazines in their home.
- **A 'can do', growth mindset** which is used for all learning. By giving learning 100%, trying new and sometimes challenging things, improvement happens.
- **They talk with others about their books and reading** with conversations ranging from illustrations, to authors, to jokes, to science experiments and more. They talk at school, at home, on the bus, to Grandparents and others.

On another note we will continue to add maths games to the school facebook page and class dojos. We thank all who are providing their children the opportunity to build their sense of number in this engaging way,

Vietnam Veterans' Day

Kadina Memorial's Middle School Council representatives attended Vietnam Veterans' Day at Moonta on Sunday 18 August.

Captain Victoria McKay and Publicity Officer Layla Love were accompanied by their peers who were on official Army Cadet duty during the service.

Students heard about the war's first major battle, The Battle of Long Tan, when 18 Australians were killed and 21 wounded, while the Viet Cong suffered the loss of 245 men with many more wounded.

Vietnam Veterans Association of Australia Copper Coast Sub-Branch Vice President Rob Nankivell spoke of other major battles and casualties. In total approximately 61,000 men and women served in the Australian Army, Navy and Air Force in Vietnam, or in the waters adjacent Vietnam, during the conflict between May 23 1962 and 29 April 1975.

He teaches students to bring maths to life by crafting stories in which characters take actions that add, subtract or divide. Professor Matthews highlights the importance of engaging Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students in mathematics to ensure they are prepared for life beyond school.

"Maths is one of those subjects that is a gatekeeper to jobs, it gives access to other opportunities in life, and it's important for every student," said Professor Matthews.

All students enjoyed the activities and games, we even braved the cold weather to look at mathematical patterns in nature. In all, students had a fun and engaging experience of learning maths.
