Principal's Report: Alistair Williams

Term 3 is the beginning of a fresh start after a well-deserved two-week break.

It also heralds the start of Semester 2, with the studying of new subjects for some, and continuing and consolidating learning for all, including students and staff.

For our year 12s it signals the final countdown to the last day of senior school life and less than 100 days to the first exam!

I also extend a warm welcome to the 12 new students to our school who have moved from other regional centres and Adelaide. I am confident our student mentor program will make your transition a friendly and less daunting experience.

Over the next 10 weeks students will be offered many opportunities to participate in additional extracurricular activities as approved on the school calendar.

Sport SA and Knock Out carnivals, a maths quiz night, and the R-6 discos are just a few of the highly anticipated and exciting events on offer.

Families are reminded a student's participation in a school event is not automatically guaranteed, with attendance, behaviour and their ability to maintain and attain learning major considerations.

Further, the return to a more 'normal' school calendar is guided by SA Health's COVID-19 advice, and ultimately hinges on the state's continued low infection rate.

As a school community it is critical we continue to model good personal hygiene, by practising regular handwashing, reminders to younger children (and older), as well as adults social distancing during school drop-off (8:30-8:40am) and pick-up times (3-3:10pm).

It is also widely appreciated if unwell children are kept at home until they have recovered, even if it is a cough, a sniffle, or a sore throat, as we all do our best to stop the spread of infectious diseases.

Lessons in History

In this week's newsletter we focus on the History and Social Sciences (HASS) faculty, with past events teaching future lessons.

Miss Tucker's year 10 History class was challenged to match her effort of making 1,000 paper cranes to mark the 75th anniversary of Japan's surrender in the Second World War.

The result is over 1,000 paper cranes cascading the library wall as a symbol of hope, healing, and peace. Students researched events during this period, including the two catastrophic atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

We welcome three teaching staff to the team in term 3, all of whom are very familiar with our school.


Tania Bell, who has been a relief teacher, has taken on Julia Calabrese's role in the Unit's junior classroom.

I would like to welcome Tania Bell to our Disability Unit teaching team. Tania is replacing Julia Calabrese as the full time Junior class teacher. She has worked as a TRT and is familiar with the students and class routines.



This term our integrated theme is Weather/Seasons. In weeks 1 and 2 we will be focussing on weather words, what the weather is like, weeks 3 and 4 the season Winter, weeks 5 and 6 the season Spring, weeks 7 and 8 the season Summer, and in weeks 9 and 10 the season Autumn. So far, we have looked at weather symbols, discussed what the weather is each day, made weather pictures in Art and prepared rainbow rolls in cooking.

The Senior class will revisit their recycling program, collecting containers from baskets located around the school, washing and sorting them and then taking the containers to the recycling depot every second Thursday. Unit students certainly appreciate everyone who puts their recyclables into these baskets.

Literacy lessons will continue with a focus on the 4 Blocks of Literacy components (working with words, shared reading, writing and self-selected reading). The English competition will be held during week 6, with the Mathematics competition scheduled in week 7 (days to be confirmed).

History and Social Sciences

Over the course of Semester One, Kadina Memorial students studying History and Social Sciences (HASS) hopped in a time machine and took a trip through time and to various places around the globe.

The Year 3 to 6 students travelled back to the late 1700's to explore what life in the early settlement of Australia was like, investigating the reasons for settlement in the Copper Triangle, with a focus on what has changed and what still remains the same today. They also enjoyed learning about different celebrations throughout the year and from around the world. Many discovered that significant days in countries that they were yet to visit were celebrated in very similar ways – friends and family, special foods, gifts and community activities.



Whilst the Year 3/4s stayed closer to home, the Year 5/6s took their time machine further afield and investigated the lasting impacts of the Gold Rush on Australian society in relation to population, multi-culturalism and democracy. Once they'd returned from the gold fields they produced their own primary sources, short booklets recording their life experiences having lived through their own significant historic event, COVID-19.



For the Year 8 students, they travelled back to the 1300's and studied the effects of the Black Death. From their findings they produced informative magazine articles and some creative covers in English lessons to be published with their work. Some of these are printed with this article.



Miss Tucker's Year 10 History class were not immune to the time-travel bug and hitched a ride through the Inter-War Years, World War Two in Europe and the Pacific, Rights and Freedoms and Post-War Migration to Australia (phew! What a trip!).

As part of their course in Semester One, students heard the story of Sadako Sasaki, a child-victim of the Hiroshima Bombing. While she lived, Sadako folded one thousand paper cranes as a symbol of hope and good fortune. Today the folding of one thousand paper cranes is often used as a symbol of remembrance for the innocent victims of nuclear warfare. Students created a memorial to the victims of nuclear war, folding 1000 paper cranes for a display that is currently in the Library. As August marks the 75th Anniversary of the Bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, this memorial is particularly significant in 2020.



During the last lesson of the Semester the students of 10MD cooked various dishes from around the world, showing how Australian cuisine is influenced by the skills, tastes, foods and dishes that have permeated Australia through the migration of people from different cultures. Some of these recipes were a hit (Fried Rice or Eaton Mess, anyone?) and some were less so (Potato Scones were not a success).

While History is often viewed as a subject that has endless dates and names, these activities assisted students to develop the 21st Century skills of empathy and social-justice, resilience and perseverance, listening and problem solving, critical and creative thinking and global awareness.

Those who elected to study Geography hit the field and looked closely at the environment that they occupy. With fieldwork becoming a major focus, year 10 students investigated the recent upgrades that have occurred in the Kadina Central Business District, creating maps (see Brooklyn's map below) and evaluating the improvements. Yr 11 students focused on safe and unsafe spaces within school grounds, evaluating and recommending possible improvements. Yr 12 students have been planning their independent fieldwork study collecting various forms of data. Safety within the Kadina CBD, traffic management within the Kadina CBD, and the impacts of coronavirus on local tourism are some of the topics being investigated. Fieldwork is a great way for students to learn about local issues while also exploring the environment.




Figure 1: map of the CBD upgrades

2020 School closure day CANCELLED

A school closure day previously scheduled in term 3 on Friday 4 September has been cancelled as agreed by the NY Partnership.

Whole school closures are assessed and recommended by schools' Governing Councils through the NY Partnership, and considered by sites' Education Directors each year.

Traditionally, closures coincide with major community events such as the Royal Adelaide Show and the YP Field Days, citing benefits to students, families, and staff, enabling the school community to participate and enjoy. The cancellation of the Royal Adelaide Show due to COVID-19 has meant there is no valid reason for a school closure, and it is now considered a normal school day.
