For safety reasons I encourage all students and families walking to school to use the pedestrian crossings on Doswell Terrace when entering or exiting the school.



R-6 Corner: Is it Bullying?

As a school we constantly review what we are doing, asking: is this working? Is it making a difference? Is this having an impact?

One of the interesting findings from our term 3 review was students' understanding of the difference between rude/mean and bullying behaviour, their role during various situations and what needs to happen next.


We use the details on this poster to teach about this impact and what we can do to change our attitude and actions. Students generally can now identify the differences between such behaviours at an age appropriate level and, when required, their own individual behaviour in regards to this.

How has this occurred? Pastoral Care lessons on Monday teach explicitly how to work with others, be part of groups and the impact of our actions on us personally and others. Honesty about our actions, reflecting on personal behaviour and then planning for successful communications are part of this. The poster pictured is in all teaching environments and referred to when required. In addition, staff use teachable moments to reinforce this learning in the context of a school day. When required school leaders meet with students who require a more intensive approach, and practice learning opportunities are organised.

This consistent R-6 approach combined with many layers of support has resulted in students developing their understanding of these critical life skills.

The Festival of Music Team did, however, come up with an alternative plan so choirs within schools could continue in a COVID-safe way, and that was to create a movie featuring the songs the students have been learning so they could visit their local cinema and have a sing-along with the now virtual orchestra and dance troupe they would usually perform with in Adelaide.

The NYP Choir Teachers wanted to do one better, and as restrictions eased we realised a scaled-down performance using the movie would be achievable. C1 work skills program

At the beginning of term 3, C1 was introduced to the idea of collecting reusable items and forwarding these to recycling places. Staff were encouraged to bring in any collected bread tags or bottle tops and our program has developed from donations.

We have concentrated on plastic bottle tops which has included developing ways in:

- Preparing resources by washing and draining
- Sorting into colours, types of materials by number, non-recyclable
- Counting and packaging
- Keeping records
- Design skills to make a counting frame and alter as needed
- Working together and supporting each other
- Keeping our workspace clean tidy and orderly!
- Organisation

At the conclusion of term 3 we had collected, sorted, and sent 1,505 plastic bottle tops and two large bags of metal bottle tops to Transmutation for recycling.

We originally planned to send plastic bottle tops to Lids for Kids to be made into prosthetic limbs but COVID-19 has restricted this. We are open to suggestions.

Stage 1 Outdoor Education Bushwalk

Students participated in a three-day minimal bushwalk at Deep Creek for their Stage 1 Outdoor Education Bushwalk last term.

Students had been preparing for six weeks prior, ensuring that they had completed a detailed route card, prepared healthy and nutritious meals, and had organised a thorough list of items to take. Safety concerns such as hypothermia and heat stroke were also discussed.

After a four-hour bus trip we arrived in the conservation park and were greeted with sweeping views across the water out to Kangaroo Island. We were very fortunate with the weather. We met the Ranger who warned us that with the rain from the previous week, conditions were very slippery, especially in the steep sections. We cautiously commenced our walk and it wasn't long before people were slipping and sliding. A white pair of Wallaroo football shorts soon became caked in mud.

Arriving at our camp that night we settled in, built a fire, and told stories and jokes to pass the time.

The next day we were up and off, heading toward Deep Creek waterfall and eventually to Tapannapa Camp Ground. The track weaved around wooded spurs, across trickling creeks and then up to camp. The views only seemed to get better as we climbed out of the gully and had lunch looking out to Tunkallila Beach.

Our camp was small and sheltered but provided us all with a good night's rest before the long drive home the next morning.
