

ANZAC Day

Kadina Memorial School students attended ANZAC Day services across Yorke Peninsula. Student leaders participated in an official capacity representing the school at Kadina, Wallaroo and Bute Returned and Services League commemorations.

Kadina Memorial School is a 'living' memorial to those men and women who served, and continue to do, in the Australian Defence Forces and Peace Corps.

The district's forebears raised funds to build the former Kadina Memorial High School, where the Honour Rolls are located in the main front archway. It's a legacy we are proud to inherit and uphold as a community.

The vibrant poppy display on the school's front fence was a stunning tribute commemorating the sacrifices of many during war for the freedoms we enjoy today. Thank you to Parent and Friends members who established the display during the school holidays.

The Poppy Project continues to resonate within the community, with purple poppies being crocheted and knitted to recognise the role of animals during war and peace time operations.

It's a beautiful way to connect with the community while also providing authentic learning for students of events which has shaped our nation's history.

A 'Celebration of Life' was held for Lisa last Friday at the Maitland Football Club.


Kadina Memorial School extends its heartfelt condolences to Lisa's family, husband David, children Blake and Cooper and her extended family.

Welcome to term 2, a time for deep and consistent learning. As a school we are proud of the broad and balanced range of learning opportunities our students are able to participate in.

This year our specialist teachers are trying a different approach to keep families informed of their children's progress.

You will receive with this newsletter a letter detailing your child's progress at the end of term 1 using colour bands or a 'traffic light' approach. Progress has been colour banded with **purple = your child is working well and above standard**, **green = your child is performing at standard level**, **yellow means the child is at risk of not meeting the requirements of the learning area** and a **red colour indicates your child is not meeting the learning requirements and is well below standard**.

Often student's effort and attitude impacts on their educational outcomes. Students who are focused, listening, asking questions, willing to take risks and respond to feedback make the most of their learning.

Other sub schools have used this 'at a glance' approach with families taking the opportunity to talk with their child regarding their progress and sometimes contacting the teacher to plan for more information about how we can work together to maximise all learning opportunities.

Youth Environment Forum

Congratulations to Rushton Sims, 7SB KMSC representative, who applied and won a position on the 2021 Youth Environment Council. Rushton was accepted for his keen interest in sustainability, environment and student voice.

On Thursday 29 April Rushton attended a Welcome Forum at Cleland Wildlife Park, where students from across the state in years 7-11 met other like-minded students to focus on leadership skills, team building and public speaking. The group participated in activities (icebreakers), workshops (photography, bird identification, wetlands), and forums.

Rushton said, "It was a great experience to meet new people and be inspired by students who are passionate about the environment, such as those who want to help the environment by scaling back on the effects of microplastics and single use plastics."

This term in week 3 Rushton will attend a camp at Arbury Park Outdoor School to further develop his leadership skills, and knowledge of environmental and sustainability themes. One of Rushton's responsibilities will be to research an area of interest and develop a plan of action.

Although it is early on, Rushton said "I hope to make a difference in our community. I am considering starting up an Environmental Group for Middle School with the aim of implementing the new bin system".

As a school, we support Rushton in his endeavours, and know he will also be assisted by the Middle School Kadina Memorial School Council (KMSC) and our school's Sustainability Group.

Kadina Memorial School's AFL Program students competed against Central Yorke's Football Academy in what is hoped to be an annual challenge between the two organisations on Wednesday 7th April.

The day kicked off with a modified 9-a-side match between the Central Yorke Girls' AFL Academy students and a made-up side of keen footballers from Kadina. In warm conditions the girls demonstrated a high level of fitness, contesting many tackles and the ball. Although our girls expressed their nerves before the match, they started in great fashion with two quick goals to establish an early lead.

This lead continued to grow in the second quarter with Olivia Elsworthy providing a presence up forward and Rachel Valenti dominating the midfield. Lucy Bussenschutt played the ruck position and provided our on ballers with first use a majority of the time, whilst also using great handballing skills to release the outside runners such as Jorja Rogers and Rachel Valenti.

As the match continued Kadina dominated the contest. Olivia Elsworthy recorded seven goals and Rachel Valenti was name best on ground by umpire Chris Cook in an impressive display of speed, skill and game awareness.

Governing Council April Meeting

At the first meeting of the new Kadina Memorial School Council the 2021 budgets for the Disability Unit, the Canteen and the Memorial School were presented and approved. Late last year the proposed budgets were presented and conditionally approved with final version reflecting actual enrolments presented at this meeting. We learnt about different funding for various age groups, the way the schools focus is literacy is supported through resources, funding for sanitary products and the need to ensure we can cover our loans.

Council is particularly impressed with the low figure of 1% unpaid school fees (these will be progressed to the debt collection stage) and thank all for their commitment to pay and staff for offering payment options to families to achieve this.

An arts report was shared with all valuing the varied opportunities available for our country students.
