Local history lesson


Kernewek Lowender Festival is providing many opportunities for students to learn about the district's Cornish heritage.

I decided to make the "Big Chop," and donate a large portion of my hair to Sustainable Salons, where they receive hair to make wigs for those who suffer from Alopecia and Cancer. Each ponytail ranged from 35-40cm, to be posted to Sustainable Salons in the hope to positively impact the strong and beautiful lives around me.

School Road Safety Reminder

I urge all families to talk to their child on ways to walk or ride their bike to school safely.

Pedestrian, cyclists and vehicle traffic on Doswell Terrace and Hallett Street is extremely busy before and after school.

An incident recently, between a student riding a bike and a motorist, was a reminder of how quickly an accident can occur. Fortunately, in this instance no-one was injured but all were shaken.

We do encourage students, who can, to walk or ride their bikes to school as this promotes a healthy lifestyle and a sense of independence, ready for adulthood.

Year 5 students also attend a week-long Bike Education program at Kadina Memorial, where qualified instructors take students riding their bikes out into the busy streets to teach road rules and signals.

However, children and young people are just that, and sometimes in the hurry and excitement to get to a destination, they may not be as attentive as they should.

Therefore, we ask the following:

- Remind your child about their responsibility and rules of being a road user while riding their bikes
- If walking to school, please use the pedestrian crossing supervised by staff and crossing monitors on Doswell Terrace
- Motorists, please slow down to 25 km p/hour while driving in the school precinct when children are present
- If carparking is an issue, the Copper Coast Sport and Leisure Centre car park has many available spaces, providing a safer option to walk to school on the footpath

I, along with other staff, are on duty during these busy times, whilst Kadina Police are currently monitoring the area.



Stage 2 Outdoor Education – Sustaining the North Beach Sand Dunes

The Outdoor Education curriculum requires students to engage in learning “About Natural Environments”. This year our students are supporting the Copper Coast Council (CCC) in re-developing and sustaining the sand dunes at North Beach.

Prior to our first session a meeting was held with Tim Neumann, Director of Infrastructure for the CCC and Briony Horner from Succession Ecology. From this, valuable information was provided for the students which detailed the natural processes that occur along this stretch of coast and the impact of human involvement.

Over the next month the aim is that the class gains an appreciation of our local environment and understands the methods employed to sustain this valuable area.

Our first session was held on Wednesday 5th May. Upon arriving at the beach, we were greeted by several friendly employees from the CCC. After an introduction to the worksite the students were armed with shovels, metal clips and pliers. We set about inspecting the drift fences, ensuring that they were intact and serving their designed purpose. As we walked along the beach students were also shown invasive species of weeds and informed of how the drift fences are designed to work. We were even set homework tasks by CCC employees.

In the coming weeks students will continue to monitor the fences, remove weeds such as Gazania’s and Silver Leaf Night Shade, and potentially participate in some planting of native vegetation.

This is a new project for our students, and we thank the Copper Coast Council and Succession Ecology for supporting Kadina Memorial School.
