R-12 Semester 1 Reports go home today, which provide an effort achievement and grade for subjects studied.

This is an important time to talk and listen to your child about why they enjoyed some subjects, and where they could improve in areas, whilst focusing on their strengths.

In class, students will revisit their individual learning goals at the start of term, with strategies in place if required.

R-6 parents and caregivers will have an opportunity to meet with teachers to discuss learning and wellbeing in week 4, from **Monday 9 August to Friday 13 August**.

Middle and some senior students will begin new electives, such as Home Economics, Agricultural Science and Technical Studies.

Senior students will continue pathway and subject selection discussions.

This can be daunting, but by working together and asking lots of questions, I assure you the transition to senior school will be made easier.

The updated version builds on our successful guidelines, put in place at the start of 2020, as part of a statewide Department for Education plan regarding student use of mobile phones in schools.

In a nutshell, our school's position hasn't changed, with all R-12 students not to use their mobile phones and like devices while at school. Dear Parents and Caregivers,

As part of our continuous school improvement process, we will be involved in an external school review with a Department for Education review panel.

The purpose of external school reviews is to support us to raise achievement, sustain high performance and provide quality assurance to build public confidence in government schools.

All government schools are externally reviewed every 3 years.

The focus of the external school review is to evaluate our school's performance. The review panel includes a review officer and a trained review principal. Our school review will occur on **Monday 16th to Wednesday 18th August.**

The review panel will identify aspects of our school's improvement that have been verified through the review processes, as well as the improvements that we need to make in the future.

During the external school review, some students, parents, governing council members and staff will be asked to provide information to the review panel in a number of ways. These include:

- individual interviews
- group discussions (with students or staff or parents)
- meetings (governing council, staff meeting)
- visits into classrooms.

We appreciate everyone's support and time in helping us with this external school review process.

If you **do not** want your child to participate in the review, please inform the Front Office by **Monday 2 August (week 3).**

Disability Unit

In the Unit, students engage in a wide variety of literacy programs and activities to enhance their ability to communicate with others, listen, read, write, interpret spoken language and extend on their current knowledge. In the Junior Unit class students have been learning about the Jolly Phonics letter sounds ck, e, h, r, m, d through structured lessons, songs and rhymes and creative art/craft activities.

The Senior Unit class has focused on letter sounds, onset and rhyme activities, sentence structure and using grammar during writing lessons this term. Students created a narrative and ensured that the following were included:

- Title
- Orientation
- A Complication
- A Resolution
- An Ending

Students also focused on editing, publishing, illustrating, and making their stories into books. The students were very proud of their final products and thoroughly enjoyed reading their stories to others.

Kadina Memorial School's Work Placement Program

Work placements for senior students are a valuable experience, providing students with an insight into skills and qualifications required for future employment and potential career paths.

The traditional 'work experience' week is critical to give students a sense of the expectations, roles and responsibilities needed in a workplace. Year 10 students have been welcomed into many regional businesses and organisations as part of their SACE Dynamics studies to build their skills and knowledge this week and in recent times.

It's also an opportunity for students to experience the 'realities' of a particular job, rather than a perceived idea of what a particular career might entail.

At school, the performing arts redevelopment has given Certificate I in Building and Construction students a prime opportunity to see first-hand how an architectural plan on paper evolved into a physical large-scale building site.

Students have met with BluBuilt Constructions as part of the company's 'School Immersion' program, where personnel shared industry knowledge, skills, and career pathways.

Students were also 'walked and talked' through the logistics of a worksite, from making sure materials arrived on time, to the added risks of working in a school with wayward basketballs coming over the fence, to daily communication with sub-contractors.

Project manager Daniel Toole, a former Kadina Memorial High School student, also shared his study and career path with students.

From the students' visit, an opportunity to participate in a work placement program on-site was offered, with year 11 student Lucas Schmidt taking up the challenge, Jared Brooks will be on site this week.

The 'School Immersion' program demonstrates how schools and industry across various sectors can align to foster potential employment opportunities for country students.

In addition, we have many senior students currently undertaking School-Based Apprenticeships, industry traineeships and VET courses, providing students with a direct pathway into employment.

The Kadina Memorial School Year 8/9 Football team has sadly been eliminated after Round 1 of the 2021 Statewide Knockout competition. On a picturesque day for football, Kadina finished with one win and one loss in the three team round robin tournament held at Balaklava earlier this term.

Game one saw Kadina play Nuriootpa High School in what turned out to be the deciding game for the day. The match started with great intensity as both sides committed their bodies to the contest, desperate to earn an extra day off school later in the term. Nuriootpa got away to a fast start, capitalising on numerous mistakes made by Kadina players. Riley 'running man' Beech kickstarted Kadina's scoring, seemingly getting lost from his position on the wing to end up in the attacking goal square, much to everyone's surprise. With their first goal, Kadina's midfield seemingly kicked into gear with Brayden Phillips, Codie McBride and Mitch Cunningham finding plenty of the ball. As the game wore on, Hunter Wellgreen and Dom Bagnato (2 goals) found more of the football, with their 'Dustin Martin' style fend-offs a highlight of many attacking plays. Unfortunately, the superior size of Nuriootpa's players proved too much over the course of the game, Kadina eventually going down by 39 points.

Having watched Nuriootpa defeat Golden Grove High School in the second game, the Kadina players knew that the final game of the day was purely for pride. Golden Grove came out of the blocks with a flash, quickly jumping to a two-goal lead in the opening minutes. Angus Hewett kickstarted the scoreboard for Kadina with a brilliant crumbing goal before Dom Bagnato (3 goals) quickly followed up with one of his own. Golden Grove finished the first half on a high, kicking two late goals to snatch an 11-point half time lead. The second half saw a complete shift in momentum, Kadina moving the footy smoothly and skilfully across the ground, piling on the goals. Kadina's 'Caleb Daniel 2.0,' Billy Harris, found his way into the contest in the front half, whilst Charlie Krieg crashed kamikaze style through many packs to help lead the defence. A late goal to Chris Grantham, his first of 2021, capped off a stunning turnaround to see Kadina eventual winners by 14 points.

Although the team was eliminated from the competition, the boys could hold their heads high that they represented the school in a positive light and never gave up. Their ability to provide a genuine contest against physically superior opposition was admirable. 

Cancelling lunch orders that have already been paid for

To cancel a food order from your itemized eReceipt:

- 1 Sign into your Qkr!™ account and scroll down to 'My Receipts' section
- 2 Select eReceipt for order you wish to cancel
- 3 You will see a red circle containing the 'minus' symbol beside your child's photo. Tap this. A pop-up box will appear asking if you wish to proceed. Tap 'Yes'
- 4 If your eReceipt contains food orders for more than one child, you will need to cancel one by one.

OR

To cancel a food order from the calendar view:

- 1 Sign into your Qkr! account and go to calendar view for food orders
- 2 Select date for which you wish to cancel order
- 3 Tap 'Cancel Items' on the pop-up box which appears
- 4 Another pop-up box will appear asking if you wish to proceed. Tap 'yes'

To reduce school costs, cancelled food orders are refunded in the form of credit for future orders. A 'Refunded' stamp will appear on your eReceipt confirming that the order has been cancelled and a credit is available for future food orders. The value of any outstanding food order credits will automatically be deducted from your next Qkr! food order.

Please contact your school office directly to cancel any other (non-food) school payments. These refunds need to be processed through the school office according to school policy.
