Book Week is a popular annual five-day event on the school calendar, culminating in a R-12 dress-up day on Friday.

This year’s theme ‘Old World, New Worlds, Other Worlds’ inspired imaginations, with students and staff travelling to the destinations of their favourite book characters and superheroes.

There were many cloaked muggles resembling Hogwarts School of Witchcraft and Wizardry from the Harry Potter series.

Of course, there’s a more serious side to Book Week – the magic of reading encouraging life-long literacy.

Learning to read and write starts by understanding sounds with a comprehensive phonics program taught in the Early Years.

Students continue to develop their knowledge throughout their education, progressing to more complex literature and writing techniques by Year 12.

Research shows students rapidly improve their literacy skills when reading is encouraged at home.


Year 8 Business & Economics

Self-Reliant Bushwalk

The culmination of the Stage 2 Outdoor Education course requires students to plan and undertake a three-day journey with minimal teacher supervision. This year, the choice was to go on a bushwalk in the Melrose region.

With planning beginning in the latter half of term 2, students decided on what they needed to organise, allocated roles and booked transport and the relevant campsites. From there they planned a beginning location for the walk and a destination for the bus to pick them up. The only requirements set by the teachers were that they had to:

- stick to their pre-planned route card
- meet the teachers at agreed designated checkpoints
- take a group photo at Sugar Gum Dam campsite
- incorporate some “off track” walking
- be at the bus on the last morning before 11am

After a long bus trip, Mr Wood and Mr Williams quickly departed, heading off into the hills, leaving the students to realise that there was no-one to rely on and that they now had to use their navigation skills and make decisions for themselves.

Wandering off along the creek as it meandered through the hills to the first check point, the students were unknowingly “shadowed” by the teachers who discretely crouched behind bushes, ensuring that an incorrect turn off, or a mistake in navigation was avoided. Crossing creeks whilst keeping dry became quite the exercise in problem-solving and teamwork.

That night, the students, cooked their meals safely and enjoyed one another’s company as they sat by their own fire.

The mornings required the students to conduct a briefing with one another and then confirm their plans with teachers. The second day was long and involved, some steep climbs, painful descents and eventually a most welcome campsite. Students were again shadowed as they worked together to follow the correct creek line, choose the appropriate turn-off and ensured their health and wellbeing was monitored by designated group leaders.

The final morning saw them rise at 5:15am, pack up in the dark and head off along the track guided by the lights of their head torches. A strenuous ascent awaited as they stood at the base of Mt Remarkable. The brisk morning air took their breath away as they finally reached the top of the Mount, however with a seven-kilometre descent the group was still far from the welcome comfort of the bus.

Navigating the switchbacks of the track, eventually they all made it back to the bus, eager to get going and clear the shelves at the Crystal Brook Bakery.

The three-day trip was made successful by this group’s ability to work together. Their skills in navigation, teamwork and problem-solving clearly developed over the walk. They should be pleased with their efforts. Hopefully this course has given them the confidence to experience the great outdoors, whilst maintaining an appreciation for the environment.

Sophie undertook the project on top of her Stage 2 studies to gain more information about the dairy industry and calf rearing for her External Production Investigation.

On Sunday 22nd August, a group of year 9 students demonstrated their handling skills and the school's smart new Ag uniform in the school goat competition at the Kadina Show. The team placed third in the Grand Parade and throughout the 12 heats, Aimee Bettess won a spot in the final!

A big congratulations goes to Dylan Scott for showing great patience in growing potatoes. He trialled growing them in a variety of different ways and was very happy when he got to harvest some!

Among this, there has been some fantastic year 7's who are responsible for the collection, washing and stamping of the eggs from the school chickens. They have been exceptionally dedicated and I'm not sure what's louder, the students laughing or the chooks clucking!

A recent introduction has been Primary classes coming down to visit the animals and see what happens in Ag. Sometimes the senior students get excited about sharing their knowledge with the younger classes to show them what they have learnt and get others excited about the opportunities that it can bring.

Kadina Memorial's Open Boys Knock Out Football team won the State Championships Pool B by 61 points against Victor Harbor in Adelaide on Tuesday 24th August. Keen to avenge last year's loss in the final the boys played terrific footy throughout the initial stages of the tournament accounting for Glossop High and Kapunda High in round 1, Saint Mark's College and Golden Grove High in round 2, Marryatville High and Nazareth Catholic College in the semi-finals.

The weather was perfect conditions for footy and the Thebarton oval conducive to fast footy which suited us. The first quarter was a tight affair. Dewy conditions made for a few fumbles. Quarter time scores were Kadina 1 – 4 : 10 to Victor 1 – 1 : 7.

The second quarter we really started to get on top all over the ground, the backs were doing a great job in their one-on-one contests, the midfield controlled the centre of the ground and were on top at the stoppages with Jonte giving Will, Dylan and Jedd first look. The forwards were working well together and the introduction of Angus Cock into the forward line after resting a sore ankle in the first quarter worked a treat with him kicking two handy goals. Half time scores were Kadina 5 – 8 : 38 to Victor 1 -1 : 7.

In the third quarter Kadina again controlled the play and the ball 'lived' in our half of the ground as Victor put numbers behind the ball we couldn't quite translate our dominance to the scoreboard. A nasty injury to the courageous Lochi Nolan also hurt our momentum. Victor kicked a late goal to give them a sniff. Scores at three quarter time were Kadina 7 – 11 : 53 to Victor 2 – 1 : 13.

In the final quarter the team played some of the best footy they had played throughout the tournament, understanding the situation of the game. We continued to get our hands on the footy and controlled it with precise ball use and excellent decision making. At the siren, Kadina won 11 – 14 : 80 to Victor 3 – 1 : 19. All the boys contributed winning the positions in their role on the field.
